Thursday afternoon our distinguished visitors will inspect the Roseburg facility, accompanied by officers of the local Legion and unit. On Friday, they will proceed to Marshfield, where a district conference will be held. Several units of Roseburg veterans and unit members plan to attend the conference.

Saturday night Drain post and unit will receive their charter from the department officers and Umpqua unit and post have been asked to conduct the initiation ceremony. Additional appropriation for the federal bureau of investigation will be urged by the auxiliary in order that the personnel of the

bureau can be expanded to cope with sabotage, espionage and subversive activities. This is considered essential for the protection of national defense industries.
