Rain Ruins Ski Prospects in Crater Lake District

Heavy rains occurred yesterday in the upper Cascade region in the Umpqua National forest, according to word received at forest service headquarters here last night. Supervisor V. V. Harpham said that radio reports received last night were to the effect that warm rains fell at Steamboat and Big Camas stations, where the ground is free of snow. It also was raining at Diamond lake where there was a snow depth of two and one-half feet. A report from Crater lake was that snow had reached a depth of 101 inches and that wet snow was falling in 20 degrees of temperature. The fresh snow ruins prospects for good skiing conditions over the week-end, Mr. Harpham said.
