

### Cougar Hoopsters Trim U. of O., 47-45

The Washington State Cougars opened a crowded northern division, Pacific coast conference basketball week by defeating the Oregon Webfoots 47-45 in Pullman last night. It was the Cougars' third consecutive win over the Oregonians.

The Cougars started the game with a rush and early in the first period ran up a large lead over their taller rivals. The Webfoots, switching to a zone defense, whittled at the Cougar lead and reduced it to 23-18 at the half.

The Cougars started again with a rush in the second half and in the first five minutes ran the count up to 28-18. Two minutes later the Webfoots were only one point behind and they went ahead on a push shot by Borchert 31-30.

It was a dog fight from then on with the result in doubt until the final gun.

Center Lindeman of the Cougars was high scorer with 19 points. Borchert and Andrews led the Webfoots with 11 apiece.

### Defense Training Program Is Planned at Glendale

GLENDALE, Jan. 21.—A class in rural defense training may be organized at Wolf Creek. The subject under consideration is an elementary course in electricity.

J. F. Swigart, principal of the Wolf Creek schools, has announced that a meeting will be held at his home on Wednesday January 22, at 7:30 o'clock to organize the class and to determine a convenient time for study periods. Mr. Swigart hopes to interest young men of Glendale and nearby localities.

All young men not in school between the ages of 17 and 24 are eligible. The course will consist of 15 hours a week for 18 weeks.

Completion of this course prepares the student to do much work around his home and would qualify him for other courses in electricity.

All expenses of the rural defense training program are borne by the federal government.
