BOYS AND GIRLS AID SOCIETY IS REPRESENTED

Through the Boys' and Girls' Aid society of Oregon, Douglas county is being represented for the first time in the Child Welfare League of America, it was announced this week by Mrs. Myrtle C. Dabziel of Portland, state director of the society.

The B. G. A. society, which is represented in this county by Mrs. Walter Fisher of Roseburg, is the only agency in Oregon and one of a comparatively small number in the northwest qualifying for full membership in the league, which is an alliance of organizations caring for children in the U. S. and Canada. The society is noted for its medical program, efficient staff, and its discrimination in finding homes suited to the particular needs of the child.

Working with the cooperation of the state public welfare commission and the assistance of the Portland community chest, the society has a board of trustees and women's auxiliary with an honorary board members in every county; a state director, a case work supervisor, and a professional case work staff.
