

14 Bowling Teams Will Compete At Zone Tourney Here

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fallacious, and referred to would be appeasers in the United States as "snake charmers." After quoting the Nazi Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler's reference to "degenerated Yankees" and his boast of ultimate world domination, Commander Kelley declared that if the axis crushes Great Britain it will follow up with an invasion of the western hemisphere, using Africa as the springboard.

Referring to the billions of dollars appropriated by congress for national defense, Mr. Kelley said such an enormous obligation would not have been thrust upon the nation at one time if the nation had heeded the defense recommendations of the American Legion in past years.

No "Draw" This Time.
"The first world war resulted in a draw, or rather it might be said to have ended in Germany's favor," Mr. Kelley declared. "Germany was far-sighted enough to ask for an armistice before her own boundaries were penetrated by the allies. This saved her industries from physical damage and enabled her to recuperate and prepare for the present war."

"The present conflict is not merely a nation against nation; it is a showdown between two ideologies, one representing totalitarian rule, the other democracy," he added. "And this time there will be no draw. Either Great Britain or Germany will go down."

Commander Kelley's address was preceded by a brief speech by Mrs. Laura Goode, state president of the Legion auxiliary, in which she summarized the aims of her organization and pledged continued cooperation with American Legion activities.

Commander Kelley is being accompanied on his tour of the state by a large group of Legion and auxiliary officials. police and fire patrol, road construction, etc., on the federally-owned property.

Included in the lands which it was felt should contribute to county government were national forests, wild life refuges, Indian reservations, Indian trust lands, Taylor act grazing lands, resettlement lands, lands sold but on which title has not transferred and lands lease for a consideration.

Per Cents Set Forth.
It also was held that the percentage of contribution should not exceed 40 per cent of the revenue raised by the counties from other sources. The contributions from national parks and monuments, it was held, should be 25

per cent of the income. A committee to coordinate the activities of the various state associations in presenting the claims of the counties for such payments in lieu of taxes was authorized.

Prior to attending the meeting at Salt Lake, Judge Bowker and Attorney Cordon attended a meeting of highway association representatives at San Francisco where resolutions were adopted urging a federal national defense road building project to include the Pacific highway.

urged that the committee ask Major George Fielding Elliot, military analyst and newspaper columnist, to testify.

The measure would change the present districts by making the city of Portland a district by itself, and dividing Douglas and Lane counties at the coast range to put all coastal areas in one district.

The congressional districts proposed would be:
1. Benton, Linn, Marion, Polk, and the portions of Lane and Douglas east of the coastal divide.

2. Baker, Crook, Deschutes, Gilliam, Grant, Hood River, Harney, Jefferson, Klamath, Lake, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wheeler, Wasco.

3. The city of Portland.
4. Multnomah county outside Portland, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington, and the portions of Lane and Douglas counties west of the coast range divide.

Neuberger said the plan is a combination of proposals by John J. Beckman, former chairman of the Multnomah county democratic central committee, and Rep. J. D. Perry (D., Columbia).

"The plan has four districts which would be closely in balance," Neuberger said. "The first district would have 292,000 population, the second district 210,991, the third district 305,394, and the fourth district 232,274."

For Junior Colleges
Junior colleges would be established in Portland, Klamath Falls, Bend, Astoria, and in Coos and Umatilla counties by a bill introduced in the house.

The measure, sponsored by the Oregon Commonwealth federation, would direct the state board of higher education to establish junior colleges in cities of more than 10,000 population situated more than 50 miles from the nearest college or normal school.

The junior colleges would give courses in subjects usually covered in the first two years of college, and would emphasize courses in mechanical, semi-professional and technical education.

All income tax receipts above \$5,000,000 a year would be diverted equally to education and old age pensions a bill introduced by Rep. Lyle Thomas (R., Polk) provides.

The receipts now total about \$6,000,000 a year.

SELASSIE STIRS ETHIOPIA TO REVOLT AGAINST ITALIANS

SOMEWHERE IN ETHIOPIA, (via Khartoum), Jan. 24.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Ex-Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia has raised the flag of his former kingdom in a hidden mountain clearing here and gone to the interior to head British-aided Ethiopian tribesmen fighting their Italian conquerors.

In a proclamation, he exhorted his tribesmen to "raise arms against the enemy who have come to destroy your race, rob your property, belittle your glory, pollute your blood. Wipe him from the face of Ethiopia."

The former "Conquering Lion of Judah," driven from his throne in 1936 by Premier Mussolini's troops, came back to Ethiopia in a British army plane.

He flew from Khartoum, British headquarters in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, where he had conferred in recent weeks with tribal chieftains who slipped across the frontier to plan with him the rearming of Ethiopian natives with British guns.
