All those women who are members will not wish to let their membership drop from such an organization for the common good. Commander James Young and with Unit President Mrs. Claude Baker, Department Welfare Chairman Mrs. Ned Dixon, Mrs. Earl Ulrich, Mrs. Arthur Midland, Mrs. James Young, Mrs. Clinton Gorthy, all local or department officers, attended the big conference held at Grants Pass Wednesday. Another conference was held at Marshfield Friday. During their visit in Roseburg, Commander Alfred Kelly and the large delegation of prominent Legionnaires visited the hospital. In the evening Commander Kelly spoke at the armory on National Defense.

We have been taught, Commander Kelly said, that the U. S. is isolated from other nations. After reading the papers, studying U. S. history, interfering with colonization, supervising trouble in South America, pulling down the Boxer rebellion, sending merchant ships to the four corners of the earth, becoming the creditor of all nations and owning 75 percent of the gold bullion of the world, can any nation so great and idealistic as that, can anyone say we are isolated?

"Today war is not on the old basis. It is not between nation and nation. The first world war, he said, was not fought in vain. It was a genuine challenge to democracy of the German peoples. Commander Kelly pointed out that Germany has had the desire to dominate the world since long before Hitler was heard of.

If Great Britain should fall and Germany must find a rich nation to pay her war debt and we have 75 per cent of the gold bullion and we are fat and defenseless. If there is any question where she will expand, where she will go to find money, if the American people can't see and won't come to the point they deserve to lose what they have, he said. The axis powers will take what they want if Germany wins, he pointed out. Africa could be made a base if Germany wins and it is closer to South America than we are, he said.

Last time the war was a draw, he continued. Germany called a halt but she was unscathed. There was no rehabilitation as in France. They won and knew it, he said. Britain, he said, must make their lives safe from the unending challenge from generation to generation from those unwilling to live in harmony. People have no conception of the danger of our position, Commander Kelly believes. Our defenses have gone to "pot," he said. We didn't have enough air defenses to defend the city of Portland. Our armed defenses stood in comparison to Russia's as 2 inches is to 18 feet. Now 17 billions have been appropriated, he reminded.

It is better to help, he cautioned, than for our children to lose the right to worship, to philosophize as they please.

Now that the national guard is put into federal service, Commander Kelly said they are away from the control of the state. The U. S. expects each state to take over its own home defense. Now that we are no longer paying for the state militia, we have that money in reserve.

Did you know, he recalled, that there is a uniformed German band in Portland? We could be sabotaged as we never dreamed, he challenged. The American Legion does not want a state guard for themselves, he said, they have made enough sacrifices.

But they are willing to make the sacrifice if they are needed, he needed.
