National Defense School Started at Myrtle Creek

MYRTLE CREEK, Jan. 28.—Instruction in a government national defense school will start Monday evening at 7 p. m., lasting three hours, in the Shirliff garage, with W. C. Valentine as instructor.

All expenses of this training course are being paid by the government, the only expense to the students will be transportation to and from the school.

Any young man between the ages of 17 and 25, who is not now attending school, is eligible to attend.

The primary purpose of the school is to give fundamental principals in auto, truck and tractor repairing, maintenance and operation; a general course in welding, backsmithing and allied subjects. These courses of instruction will extend over a period of eight weeks, and if the demand is sufficient, more than one such course will be held. Also in the realm of possibility is a secondary or advanced course, for graduates of the first course, or if a group desiring such training is large enough.

All graduates from this course of instruction will be given a certificate showing a completed period of education, and will be of value especially to those desiring employment in factories in defense preparation.

Any youth of south Douglas county wishing to attend, may see Principal Ireland, at the school house, or Instructor Valentine at Shirliff's garage.

Rifle Instruction to Be Given at Myrtle Creek

Dies Says Red Banked Million

Payroll Tax Rise Seen Under Work Rating Proposal

SALEM, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Payroll taxes of the state's seasonal industries, principally lumber and building, would be greatly increased by the experience rating system, the unemployment compensation commission reported to the legislature yesterday.

The commission said a nine-month study of the system, scheduled to go into effect July 1, showed that employers who have steady payrolls would enjoy lower payroll taxes, those without steady payrolls higher taxes.

Both the C.I.O. and A.F.L. are opposed to the system, charging that the basic industries would be penalized because of their seasonal nature.

The highest taxes would be paid by most logging and lumber operators and building contractors, while retailers, publishers, wholesalers and other small business operators would qualify in the lower brackets.

According to the report, the most benefit would be received by Willamette valley concerns north of Albany, western southern, eastern, and coastal counties, which are dependent on logging and lumbering, to pay higher taxes.

Truck Bill Argued. The senate highways committee was urged by trucking interests last night to approve a bill increasing truck weight and length limits.

Truckers said such increases were necessary to enable them to compete with Idaho and Washington truckers.

The bill, approved by the state highway commission, was opposed by representatives of the railroads, counties and motorist associations on grounds it would favor truckers at expense of the railroads, be hazardous for motorists, and harm Oregon's tourist business.

Henry Cabell, state highway commission chairman, said the state's roads would not be hurt by the increased limits.

Passage of the bill also was urged by representatives of the state federation of labor, state grange and eastern Oregon wheat league.
