

Buick Line To Add Lower Price Cars

Returning today from a business session of the Buick zone in Portland Hans T. Hansen of the Hansen Motor Co., announced today that this division of General Motors corporation will shortly introduce four new automobiles in a lower price bracket as an addition to the present series 40 special Buick line.

Mr. Hansen said he inspected the new cars at the zone meeting and heard factory and zone officials outline aggressive sales plans for the next 60 days covering the announcement of these new models and the early spring campaign on these and Buick's six other lines.

Mr. Hansen said that the new cars will be lower in price and have performance and economy even bettering the present series 40 cars and pointed out that they leave more room in the average garage "without disturbing the garden tools" and can be "parked on a dime."

The new cars will be formally announced February 1 and be on display at that time, he said.

agricultural products by bringing about uniform grades and standards and authorizing "seals of quality" for premium products was introduced in the house today, as were bills to give employers the right to request unemployment compensation hearings and to prevent payment of jobless benefits to women who quit work to get married or to have babies.

Reapportionment Asked

Rep. E. W. Kimberling (R-Grant) introduced a resolution for a constitutional amendment to make possible his reapportionment bill to give each county at least one representative.

Speaker of the House Robert S. Farrell, Jr., has not yet appointed his special 11-man reapportionment committee which will consider Kimberling's proposal as well as one by Rep. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Multnomah) which would increase Multnomah county's delegation at the expense of upstate counties.

A move to repeal all property tax exemptions was brewing in the house assessment and taxation committee, which held up approval of a measure extending exemption to parsonages.

Rep. Giles French (R-Sherman) said he objected to further tax exemptions, and favored cancelling all exemptions except those affecting federal property.

The house passed three bills and sent them to the senate. One would provide that courts shall assume that in cases where a man and wife died in an accident, they shall be presumed to have died at the same time. Under existing law, the man is presumed to have died last, hence the man's descendants obtain the estate.

Rep. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Multnomah) introduced a memorial to ask congress to pass the Pierce forestry bill, which would extend federal control over Oregon forests and put them on a sustained yield basis.

To Restrict Lethal Liquids
A bill to restrict the sale of canned heat and radiator antifreeze solutions to liquor stores will be introduced in the legislature by Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney (D-Multnomah), he said today.

"I noted that Chairman Lloyd J. Wentworth of the state liquor commission opposes a bill to abolish sale of fortified wines, because he says that if people can't drink fortified wine, they'll drink something more injurious," Mahoney said.

"So I wrote him a letter today asking just what he thinks is more injurious."

"Canned heat and anti-freeze are just as injurious, but they are more humane. They cause a quick death, whereas fortified wines cause a person to go 'nuts' and then die slowly."

"So I'm going to introduce a bill to permit sale of canned heat

Morgenthau Cites Need Of Aid To Three Nations

The amount of British dollar exchange assets available for war purchases in the United States was put by Morgenthau at \$1,811,000,000.

When Senator Connally (D., Tex.) asked whether the treasury did not plan to continue to keep the French assets "frozen" for an indefinite period, Morgenthau said:

"We are guarding them closely."
Connally remarked that he hoped they would be kept immobile, adding:

"To release these assets to the French, with the French government in control of Germany, would just be giving aid to Germany."

Debt Boost Reason Given

Vandenberg brought up the administration proposal to increase the present limit on the national debt from \$49,000,000,000 to \$65,000,000,000. Morgenthau said he and treasury aides believed that this increase would care for both the cost of the national defense program in this country and any aid extended to England under the pending bill.

"It should be adequate, as I see it today, to carry us up to June 30, 1942," the secretary testified.

"In your field of responsibility, what can the president do under this bill, that he can't do today?" Vandenberg asked.

"The chief new power would be to make available to countries he decided, munitions and other war supplies on credit."

Vandenberg asked whether this was not an "indirect" method of doing what might be done directly by amending the neutrality act, which bars credits to belligerents, and the Johnson act, which prohibits private loans to nations which have defaulted on debts to this country.

"Not necessarily," Morgenthau replied slowly.

Once when Morgenthau paused before replying, Senator Glass (D., Va.) turned to Senator Byrnes (D., S. C.) and asked:

"Why the devil do they oppose this bill?"

Senator Barkley (D., Ky.), who had overheard, remarked: "They are pettifogging."

British African Drive Nets General, 1,200 Men

cooperation between Germany and Italy was reaching a more intense phase in preparation for a joint onslaught intended to drive the British from the Mediterranean and set them back in North Africa.

Two spring offensives are in prospect—against the British in Africa and the Greeks in Albania—as a preliminary to a sudden surprise attempt to invade the British Isles themselves and thereby end the war this year as the nazis are planning to do, these informants said.

A stiffening in Italian resistance on the African and Albanian fronts was indicated by today's high command communiqué, which said the British had been driven back in fighting east of Derna, Libyan port, and that fascist warplanes had delivered "violent" attacks against the Greeks in Albania.

The high command acknowledged British air raids last night on Naples and Catania, Sicily, the latter the site of airdromes used by German dive-bombers against the British Mediterranean fleet and Malta, but asserted there was no important damage.

LONDON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Fire bombs were scattered on London by a lone raider today as air alarm sirens, silent since a daylight attack last Thursday, sounded warning four times.

Wardens, police and civilians quickly extinguished flames started by the raider's basket of incendiaries. Most of the bombs fell

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Willkie Given First Earful of Bombing Raid

Britain's Roman Catholic population toward the war. Cardinal Hinsley recently broadcast strictures against nazism.

Replying to questions when he left the cardinal, Willkie said there was no discussion on the attitude of Eamon de Valera, prime minister of neutral Eire, toward the war.

Asked whether American Catholics are in favor of aid to Britain, Willkie replied: "There is no distinction; there are no differences on the question insofar as racial or religious grounds are concerned."

He was leaving St. Paul's cathedral after inspecting bomb damage there when the sirens—first heard in London since Thursday—sounded their eerie cry.

Unperturbed, Willkie entered an automobile and proceeded to the Bank of England, where he was introduced to Montagu Norman, the bank's governor.

Neither of the men went to a raid shelter.

Willkie had started the second day of his visit in England with the visit to St. Paul's, where he described the damage done by bombs as "outrageous."

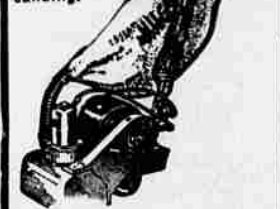
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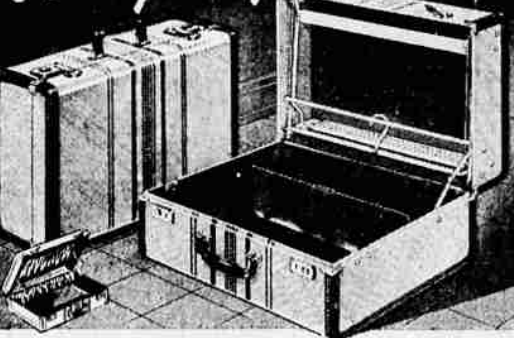
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
