Orchard, Landscape Garden Requirements Fully Met by 20-Year-Old Moyer Nurseries at Dillard

One of the busiest places in Douglas county, summer or winter, is the Moyer nurseries at Dillard.

Established over twenty years ago, it has made a steady and consistent growth until now it is in position to furnish just about everything the orchardist or landscape gardener may ask for, and that in bulk.

In addition to the fifteen-acre home nursery at Dillard, Mr. Moyer owns twenty acres of fine bottom land in Garden valley. This latter acreage largely is devoted to peach and walnut stock, roses and bulbs.

In the upper photograph accompanying this article may be observed a crew at work digging roses for shipment. From left to right, they are: Mr. Moyer, Charley Hughes, Rhonda Green, Vernon Welt, Elton Owens, My-

ron Lehne and Herman Behrendt, most of whom are Dillard residents. These roses are two-year-old stock and still carried bloom the middle of December. Over forty varieties are grown.

Mr. Moyer appears in the picture at the lower left appraising a block of one-year-old peaches. Bloom buds are in evidence even on these young trees. All standard varieties are grown.

To the right Green and Lehne may be seen digging one-year-old walnuts for shipment. The stock is Franquette, grafted on black walnut. Each tree is staked separately.

Several acres of daffodils, of the most popular varieties, are grown in the Garden valley nurseries. The blossoms are shipped east during February and March, mostly, Mr. Moyer states, to Chicago.

Just prior to the Christmas holidays the nurseries shipped over a ton of cut holly. Most of it was packed in fifteen-pound cartons, and the majority of it also was shipped to Chicago.

The number of visitors at the nurseries used to astonish me. During the planting season particularly it seemed as if nearly everyone in Roseburg—to say nothing of passing tourists—would stop there to look over the hundreds of offerings.

Finally I got the "bug" myself in at least a mild form, and now it's one of my favorite ports of call.

I know of few things more restful than a stroll through the long avenues of shrubs, trees and flowers, with their endless shadings of color, and interesting differences in size and design.

Right now I've got my eye on a dogwood— . . .
