The Indians meet Ashland Friday night and play Medford Saturday night. Victories on this trip will practically clinch the district championship for the Indians, together with the right to play in the state title tournament at Salem.

Curb on Strikes on Navy Projects Sought in Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Legislation to set up machinery, patterned on the national mediation act, to curb strikes on naval projects of all kinds was introduced today in the house.

The measure would create a naval defense labor board and outlaw strikes on naval projects until 30 days after the board had filed a report as to the merits of the disputes involved, together with recommendations for their solution.

The bill, offered by Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the naval committee, was referred to his committee for consideration. It also would prohibit naval defense contractors from making any change in the rates of pay or working conditions of their employes until 30 days after the board's report was filed.

Death Claims Nazi Judge Who Put Big Fine on Jews

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Reichs Minister of Justice Franz Guertner, 59, died last night after a short illness, an official announcement disclosed today.

In 1934, Guertner inaugurated the people's court to deal with cases of high treason and espionage. One of his most far-reaching decrees required German Jews to raise and pay a billion-mark fine in reprisal for the assassination of Ernst Vom Rath, a member of the Germany embassy staff in Paris, by a Jew in November, 1938.

Legislation to Deport Harry Bridges Revived

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Legislation directing the deportation of Harry Bridges, C. I. O. west coast maritime leader and native of Australia, was reported favorably to the house yesterday by the immigration committee.

The committee last session acted on the Bridges deportation measure, and the house passed it. The senate, however, did not act. Chairman Dickstein (D-N. Y.) said he still was of the opinion that Bridges "is illegally here and has no business here," but that "he should have a hearing." He opposed the measure on the floor last year.
