tions appeared temporarily stalemated.

Illness of a representative of the management of the International Harvester company held up negotiations for settling a strike which kept 6,500 employees of the firm's Chicago tractor works idle. Meanwhile, a company spokes-

man said, "several million dollars' worth of defense orders are being delayed."

At Mobile, Ala., about 3,400 employees of the Alabama Drydock and Shipbuilding company were idle as a result of a strike called by the Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers (CIO). The company holds contracts to build several destroyers for the navy.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 31.—(AP)—AFL leaders of 16 crafts and officials of the Oregon Shipbuilding corporation signed an agreement yesterday, preventing work stoppage on a \$4,700,000 shipyard here.

Strikes, lockouts and other stoppages are barred. A board of arbitration system was outlined.

The agreement applies only to construction of the yard and not to building of 32 ships which will follow.

bitter cold by night—and set out for the fertile uplands en route to Bengasi.

Military circles in Cairo expressed belief that Marshal Graziani's fascist legions intended to make a determined stand at Bengasi, an important naval base with a population of 50,000 which lies 150 miles west of Derna.

The British apparently were pressing their pace before German air aid can become more effective in the Mediterranean area, and also in the knowledge that Adolf Hitler yesterday promised his people a German "victory within the year."

The British freighter Sheaf Crown radioed last night that she had sighted a "suspicious submarine" about 60 miles east of St. John's Newfoundland—the first indication that axis submarines might be operating in that area, near the site of one of the U. S. bases leased from Britain.

Greeks Gain Another Goal

On the Albanian war front, military circles in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, said Italian troops had withdrawn from Tepeleni, one of the last major obstacles impeding the Greek drive toward Valona, on the Adriatic sea coast.

A Greek government spokesman announced that four Italian counterattacks on the Albanian fighting front had been repulsed and that 200 fascists, including several officers of units recently arrived from Italy, had been captured.

In the far east, an armistice agreement ending the undeclared warfare between Thailand (Siam) and French Indo-China was reported to have been signed on a Japanese warship anchored off Saigon, French Indo-China.

Border warfare had been raging since late in November.

Not So Fast

RICHMOND, Va.—The keeper of Riverview cemetery has appealed to hunters to please take a second look before shooting at the enormous elk peacefully grazing there. Twice recently rifle bullets have been sent crashing into the huge monument, placed in the cemetery last spring by the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

BOSTON, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"While the Boston market has been less active this week, due to the lack of nearby supplies of foreign wools, prices have ruled firm to a bit dearer in pulled wools."

"Activity in the west, however, has increased considerably. In consequence of the president's announcement that he desires a further appropriation of \$175,000,000 for army equipment, and also because of greater activity in the civilian division of the goods market."

"It is estimated that better than eight million pounds of wool have been contracted on the sheep's back in the far west at prices generally ranging from 30 to 35 cents to the grower, depending upon the wool, which is figured equivalent to 90 to 97 cents, clean prices, however."

"Mohair is quiet but very firm."

we can turn them out by the hundreds."

Senator Gillette (D., Iowa) asked Knox if it weren't true that even a strong navy would have difficulty in overcoming shore batteries.

"That's what makes the attempted invasion of England so dubious," Knox replied.

Gillette asked about a speech in which Grand Admiral Raeder of the German navy recently said that Germany planned to become a world navy power. When Gillette referred to the speech as "boastful," Knox said:

"All through this war, we have heard things come out of Germany and we have said they couldn't be done and in 30 or 90 days they are done." He cited the invasion of Norway and the destruction of the French army as two examples of this.

"They talk blusteringly and boastfully," he said. "I don't believe them but I get my armor ready."

where a dispute in which people not hurt, the state guard could be sent in.

"However, we're not trying to defend labor if they riot. And we have the utmost confidence in Governor Sprague. But we might have a new governor in two years who would not have his same labor policies."

Rev. Harvey Wells (R., Multnomah), a committee member, advised Wilson to forget about the amendments because "by introducing them, you are doing labor more harm than good. Mr. Public wouldn't understand this. The governor isn't going to stick his neck out by ordering the guard out in labor disputes."

Allan G. Carson (R., Marion), committee chairman, explained he had sympathy for labor's position, but added "I don't see any reason to pick out labor in these amendments. I don't recognize classes. To me, there's only one class."

Both houses ended the third week of the session today, the house adjourning for the week-end shortly before noon and the senate quitting early this afternoon.

A measure to prohibit optometrists from advertising fixed prices and to tighten qualifications of the profession was passed by the senate and sent to the house.

To Protect Draftees' Kin

A bill designed to protect the jobs and families of Oregon youths while they are in military service was introduced in the house today.

Such youths would be entitled to regain jobs equal to those they had before beginning military service, their families could not be evicted while the youths are serving in the armed forces, persons in military service would be exempt from penalties or fines for failure to pay taxes, goods bought by them on installment plan could not be repossessed, and mortgages of such persons could not be foreclosed.

Other measures introduced in the house today would create a state department of justice to be headed by the attorney general, who would appoint all district attorneys; and authorize the construction of a \$1,000,000 state office building in Salem.
