Dr. W. Everett Henry, retired Baptist minister, performed the ceremony in the presence of twenty-five relatives and close friends.

Four standards, holding tall white cathedral candles, baskets of gladioli in shades of pink, and an attractive wall mirror, encircled with greenery, formed a lovely setting for the ceremony.
