

Louis Kayoes Burman in Fifth Round

Loser Slugs With Champion From Start to Finish

Bomber Forced to Use All His Punching Power to Conquer Aggressive Challenger.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1. (AP)—Three terrific blows to the body left Red Burman draped over the bottom rope, gasping for breath through contorted lips and helpless to move, but before he went out last night the Baltimore brawler put on a fight that thrilled the crowd and won a genuine compliment from Champion Joe Louis.

"He's the only fighter besides Galento who tried to take my title away from me," volunteered the big negro. "He really came after me. I had to hit him the hardest I ever hit a man."

The big crowd in Madison Square garden saw Burman light into Louis like he never had heard of him, and continue to fight with everything he had until a final sickening right under the heart sent him down in 2:49 of the fifth round.

That was about the round that generally had been picked for the redhead's exit, but no one had foreseen the excitement he was to generate before it happened to him. He threw himself at Louis before the sound of the opening bell died away, and from there until the finish he never took a backward step.

Apparently surprised by the ferocity and tenacity of Burman's attack, Louis fought coolly and cautiously, taking many a good wallop about the head and body as he measured his man and prepared him for the kill. As usual there was no advance warning in the fifth round that the champion was ready to break Red in two.

Red Wins Fourth Round.
Burman, though bleeding from a cut over the left eye, still looked fresh as he pulled Louis across the ring for about the twentieth time and the throng of over 18,000 was sending up an awful uproar. Red had won the previous round cleanly and it had looked like anything might happen.

Suddenly, the champion whirled, put Burman against the ropes and almost buried his right glove out of sight in Red's stomach. Burman started to double, but managed to slip loose and slide past a neutral corner to another side of the ring, with Louis right on top of him.

There was another right to the pit of the stomach. Then Joe fetched the right which he said later was the hardest punch he ever struck. It landed over Burman's heart, and Red crumpled like he had been shot. In the dressing room, he had no recollection of lying across the ropes as Referee Frankie Fullam leaned over and counted to 10 in his ear.

Louis in Top Shape.
For all Burman's brave showing, Louis never looked more like a great champion than he did last night. At 203 pounds, his muscles rippled under the ring lights, and he was fast and sharp. His only mark of his 13th title defense was a small cut under the left eye, caused he said by Burman's head in the opening round. "He fought all he had," said Joe. "That's all you can ask a man to do, ain't it?"

Louis will rest only about a week before resuming training for his next bout with Gus Dozario in Philadelphia February 17.

B Teams of Four Counties to Meet In Tourney Here

Basketball teams from B leagues in Deschutes, Coos, Curry and Douglas counties will compete in the district No. 5 B tournament to be held in Roseburg, Feb. 28 and March 1, according to Tom Ireland of Mvrlle Creek, general chairman. Eight teams will take part in the tournament, with the winner to go to Ashland, March 7 and 8, for the B league championship tournament at Southern Oregon College of Education.

The Roseburg tournament will be played by the first place winners from Deschutes county; the first and second place winners from Coos county; the first and second place winners from Curry county; and the first, second and third place winners from Douglas county.

Trophies will be given the first and second place winners only. Each team will be allowed a maximum of ten players.

The committee in charge of the tournament arrangements is headed by Tom Ireland, and includes Floyd Light, Drain; J. M. Adams, Powers, and A. E. Calhoun, Gold Beach.

The first round of play will match Douglas county No. 3 team against the first place Coos county team; Curry county No. 1 against Douglas county No. 2; Coos county No. 2 against Deschutes county No. 1; Curry No. 2 against Douglas No. 1. Winners of the first two contests and the winners of the last named contests will meet in the semifinal round Saturday morning, March 1, and the finals will be played at 8 p. m. on that date. Loss of one game eliminates a participating team.

Sport Conditions Right At Crater, Diamond Lakes

Excellent conditions for winter sports will be found over the weekend in the Crater and Diamond lake areas, unless storms are encountered tonight or tomorrow, according to word received this morning by V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest.

The snow level at Crater lake stands at 128 inches, with a maximum temperature yesterday of 45 degrees and a minimum of 26 degrees. Diamond lake reports 39 inches of packed snow with one inch of soft snow which fell yesterday.

The road has been cleared for two-way traffic to Government camp, Mr. Harpham reports.

There is now snow at Big Camas, which reports that all snow in the forest is above the 3,500-foot level.

Smaller Naval Craft Bill Signed by Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed today legislation authorizing construction of 400 submarine chasers and other small naval craft and expenditure of \$509,000,000 to further expand the nation's shipbuilding and ordnance plants.

The navy already has announced its intention to ask Congress at once for about \$310,000,000 to begin immediate construction of 280 of the new vessels, including 36 ocean-going escort ships; 30 smaller submarine chasers; 24 motor torpedo boats of the "mosquito fleet" variety and 190 minesweepers.

Most of the vessels, described as "urgently needed," will be built in Great Lakes shipyards so as not to interfere with the rest of the navy's huge shipbuilding program. About a year will be required to complete them.

Kept 2 Sons From Draft Registration; Gets 3 Years

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 1.—(AP)—William Brieske, 52-year-old Monroe county farmer, was sentenced in federal court today to three years' imprisonment for preventing his two sons from registering under the selective law. The sons were freed of charges of failure to register.

destroyed and others were damaged.

While the planes were smashing at Tripoli, 700 miles across Libya from the Egyptian frontier, others were dropping "hundreds" of high explosive and fire bombs on the airdrome at Barca, on the road of the land advance from Derna to Bengasi, capital of eastern Libya.

A direct hit was scored on barracks there, the communice said. Meantime, British tanks rumbling westward along the coastal and inland roads toward Bengasi were reported to be on the very heels of retreating Italian forces.

On the East African front, the British reported further gains in their drives into Eritrea, Ethiopia and Italian Somaliland.

Ships of the Kenya coastal defenses were credited with helping in new offensives against Somaliland by transporting Nigerian troops for attacks along the coast.

The Nigerians were reported yesterday to have burned the coastal village of Kiamboi. Other British colonial forces were said to be driving into the El Wak sector of Somaliland from Kenya.

The British estimate they already have knocked out approximately 130,000 of Italian Marshal Graziani's forces—perhaps half or two-thirds of his troops in eastern Libya.

Chairman George (D-Ga.) undertook to prevent any delay in committee consideration of the measure.

A canvass of members, it was reported, showed 13 "sure" votes for the legislation among the 23 committeemen, eight votes "certain" to go against it and two presently considered "doubtful."

Results of the canvass were disclosed as the committee recalled Secretary of the Navy Knox for another day of testimony. Senator George said that if the questioning became "too prolonged and argumentative" he would request that some limitation be imposed.

Nye Charges "Pressure"
This prompted Senator Nye, an opponent of the legislation, to tell newsmen that "the pressure is on."

"There is a great deal of fear in some quarters that we might be successfully attacked," Nye declared. "I should like to allay that fear by showing that even if they (the Germans) had a fleet three times the size of ours invasion would be impossible."

WILLKIE SUMMONED TO TESTIFY ON AID BILL

LONDON, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Wendell L. Willkie rode a bicycle

on Lambeth walk today, joined in singing the song of the same name, and wrote his autograph countless times.

About 400 cockneys crowded around him when he visited the heavily-bombed, poor south side district where Lambeth palace is situated. A policeman said "he autographed everything from a package of tea to a ukulele." He also drank tea with the crowd.

Earlier he announced he would leave Tuesday to return to the United States to testify on the "lease-lend" aid to Britain bill. He said he had received a cablegram from Secretary of State Hull last night requesting his early return.

He dropped into the American Eagle club, in the heart of London, and traded a few jokes with Americans serving in the British forces.

Some of the Eagles—volunteer fliers from the United States serving in a royal air force squadron—asked Willkie to sit at the piano for a picture.

"I'll sit, but I don't play," he replied. "Anyway, let's have some sheet music."

He was handed a copy of "Thanks, Mr. Roosevelt."

bills within 10 days. After those are passed, the session generally folds up fast.

PUD Revision Asked
Governor Sprague submitted to the senate railroads and utilities committee yesterday suggested amendments to the people's utility district law which he said "are for clarification purposes only."

One amendment would provide that courts would not have to validate every revenue bond issue, but the districts still would have the option of obtaining judicial validation.

The governor also proposed that districts be given the right to exercise eminent domain to have their lines cross over private utility lines, explaining this would be acceptable to private utilities.

Referring to a proposal by the Bonneville administration that the proposed amendment to permit districts to sell bonds directly to the United States by negotiation "be stated affirmatively rather than negatively," the governor said it didn't make any difference to him.

The amendment submitted several days ago stated it negatively.

nurse. This was his third marriage.

His first wife, Sarah Houston Fleming, died in 1912. She had borne him six children. Two years after her death he married Eleanor Randolph Wilson, daughter of President Woodrow Wilson, in whose cabinet he served as head of the treasury. Two daughters were born to them. They were divorced after 20 years.

McAdoo stepped from the senate to the chairmanship of the Dollar Steamship Lines, Inc., which later was reorganized under government supervision into the American Presidents Lines. The common stock of the latter company is controlled by the maritime commission. His salary was \$25,000 a year.

Led Roosevelt Stampede
McAdoo led the stampede for Franklin D. Roosevelt during the 1932 democratic national convention, when he announced that the California delegation would swing from John Nance Garner to Roosevelt.

He first won national fame as the man who organized, financed and administered the company which built the first tunnels under the Hudson river.

At Madison Square garden in New York in 1924, McAdoo and Alfred E. Smith fought for three weeks the bitterest battle ever waged for the democratic presidential nomination, neither yielding until both were defeated and, on the 103rd ballot, a compromise candidate, John W. Davis, was nominated. Many influential democrats believed that bright prospects for a national victory were shattered by the bitterness

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Created Federal Reserve
In the early part of McAdoo's service as secretary of the treasury he instituted the drive that resulted in the creation of the federal reserve system in an effort to wrest control of the nation's finances from Wall street. When war broke out in Europe in 1914, McAdoo took the lead in the development of an American merchant marine to make the United States independent on the seas.

But the greatest responsibility devolved upon him after the United States entered the war. Billions upon billions of dollars were needed to finance the mobilization of the United States as well as to assist the allied governments in carrying on.

McAdoo proposed the sale of United States bonds of small denomination direct to the people as a means of raising the needed money. Again financiers said it could not be done, but this opposition did not alter the determination of McAdoo to try it. An issue of \$2,000,000,000 of liberty bonds was offered to the people at the start. It was over-subscribed by more than \$1,000,000,000. Three other issues were received as well.

Won Against Poverty
Born near Marietta, Ga., McAdoo's name was a struggle against poverty, and like many another successful American he spent part of his boyhood selling newspapers. He received some formal education in law at the University of Tennessee, and through his work in a law office was admitted to the bar at 21.

McAdoo's name was drawn into the Teapot Dome oil scandal investigation in the midst of the campaign preceding the democratic convention in New York. Edward L. Doheny testified that McAdoo was one of several former cabinet officers of the Wilson administration who had been retained as counsel. McAdoo hastened to Washington, denied all knowledge of Doheny's dealings for leases on the naval oil reserves, and publicly withdrew as counsel.

He then went to Chicago to confer with his supporters, but it was decided that he should continue to be a candidate for the democratic nomination. After the heartbreaking contest at Madison Square garden was lost, he went abroad to rest, returning to the practice of law in California.
