ELKTON, Feb. 7.—The Elkton chapter No. 143 O. E. S. held a regular meeting Tuesday evening.

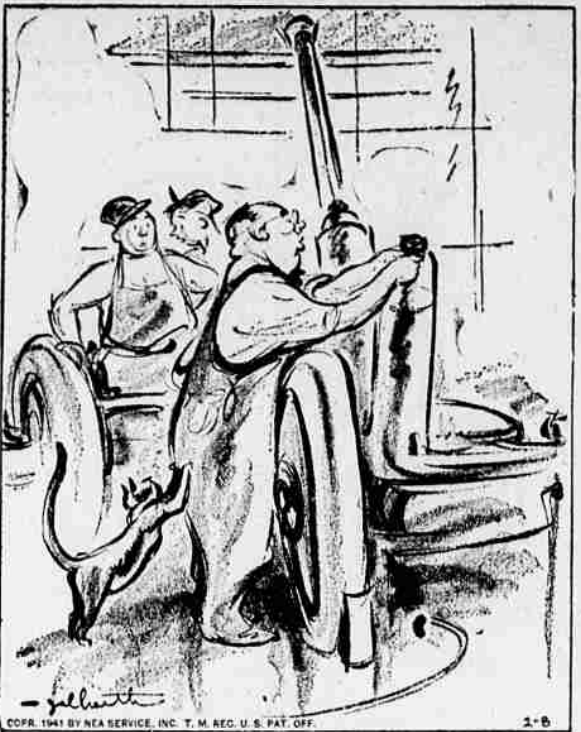

## U. S. Embassy in Rome Is Again Target of Outcry

ROME, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Pickets stationed around the United States embassy and consulate today, as a precaution against a student demonstration, were reduced to small patrols at noon when no disturbance developed. The students marched to the Piazza Venezia earlier today as they did yesterday to demonstrate their patriotism in the face of reported British attempts to reflect upon the Italian war morale. Today's manifestation was on a larger scale, with many hundreds of students participating. They lingered before Premier Mussolini's offices, cheering him and shouting patriotic slogans but when Il Duce failed to appear.

## MARKET REPORTS

WOOL  
BOSTON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "While summer street has been less active this week than last, the (wool) market keeps very strong. Evidently, the expectation of further government orders in the second quarter, together with a considerably improved market for civilian goods is sufficient to keep prices buoyed up, or a bit firmer. Interest has centered chiefly on contracting in Montana this week, where a considerable weight of wool has been purchased on the sheep's back mostly around 35 cents but as high as 37 cents has been paid for choice wool. A fur weight of wool has been taken around Montrose, Colorado, at 33-35 cents. Elsewhere in the west little has been done. "Montevideo fine wools are a bit firmer; Argentine low wools are barely firm. Australia and South Africa are hardly changed. "Mohair is quiet but firm."
