Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent.

THERE appears to be no way of appeasing the commercial fishermen and the packers. The rod and gun clubs of the state, and the Oregon Wildlife federation, are discovering that fact somewhat to their sorrow as well as to their surprise.

Last summer the Wildlife Federation, under the able leadership of Bill Smith, arranged a conference between commercial fishing interests and representatives of the federation and state clubs. This conference worked out a compromise bill to be presented to this session of the legislature.

The more conservative anglers realized that to declare the steelhead a game fish in Oregon would injure the Columbia river fishing industry. The Columbia river steelhead is said to be worth catching as a food fish whereas the coast netters have repeatedly declared they do not want steelhead.

So the bill now known as senate bill number 53, the Wildlife Federation bill, was drawn for the purpose of saving the steelhead in the coastal streams from the nets, thus providing escapement for this fighting game fish. It does not ruin the net fishermen of the coastal streams and if it did, less than 500 fishermen would be involved.

The people at the mouth of the Umpqua river have made a terrific roar about senate bill 53 and have even joined with other coastal stream fishermen in presenting a series of "spite" bills, of which H. B. 407 which would open the net season on the Umpqua January first for the purpose of allowing them to net more steelhead, is one.

The utter absurdity of the complaint from the lower Umpqua may be realized upon consideration of the fact that Oregon fish commission figures reveal that the Wildlife Federation bill, senate bill 53, could not affect the take of the Umpqua river netters more than two per cent! On the basis of the 1939 season the reduction would be only about one and one-half per cent of the take.

And yet, down at the mouth of the Umpqua, they have lashed themselves into a lather over S. B. 53 and will probably spend in fighting that bill and in promoting their "spite" measure, H. B. 407, more than the actual value of the fish involved would amount to in the entire year. (The entire catch is worth about \$90,000 annually.)

The rod and gun clubs of the eastern part of Douglas county are sponsoring no fish bills—at least none have appeared thus far in the session. They have endorsed the Wildlife Federation compromise or appeasement bill which, as is shown above, does not really do any serious damage to the Umpqua netters.

But the netters do not want peace and the near equivalent of a status quo on the Umpqua. Apparently they like this annoying and expensive fighting. Apparently they never will be sat-

isfied until they are permitted by law to take every fish out of the stream.

Fortunately the activity and greed of the coastal stream netters will ultimately so arouse the entire state that net fishing will be totally abolished—and not in the too far distant future either.

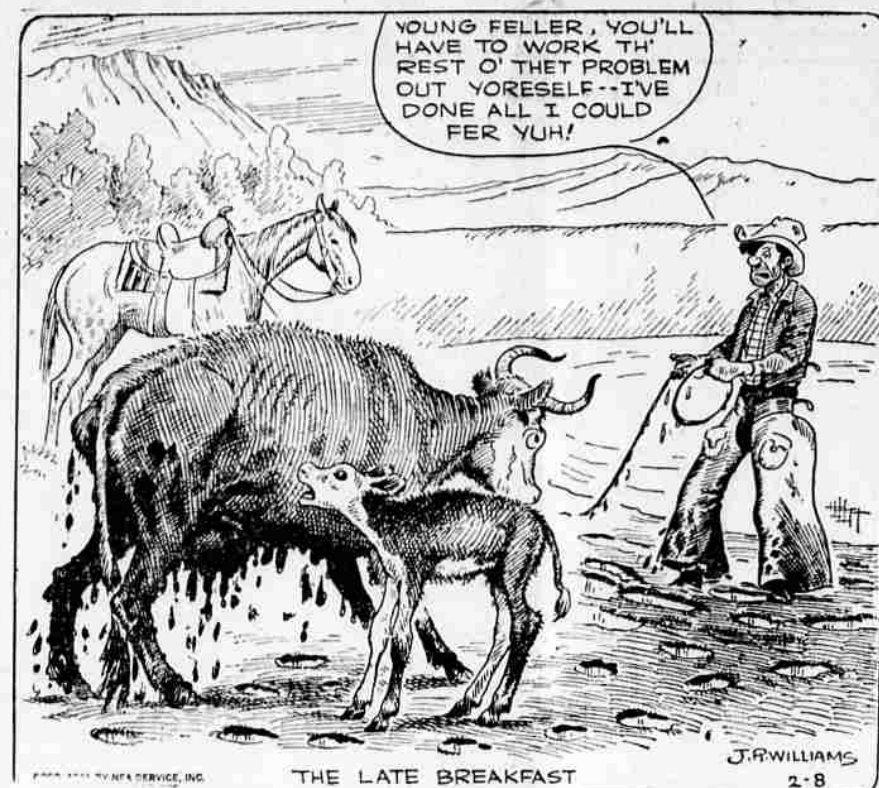
