The form of government which will prevail will be that which expresses the ideas and ideals of its people. And only those who build on ideals build for a sane future. It is impossible to fix the boundaries of personal influence, as persons are instruments of moral and spiritual forces. In our country a man is a man who exerts his power as a man either for or against democracy.

D. C. E. P. A. HOLDS MEETING AT LUNCHEON AT TAVERN SATURDAY

Douglas County Elementary Principals association met at a noon luncheon at Carl's Tavern Saturday. The guest speaker was Dr. C. B. Wade, acting health officer, and other guests were Mrs. Hazel B. Lytle and Mrs. Mary A. Barrett, two Douglas county health nurses.

Dr. Wade gave a brief history of syphilis emphasizing the fact that this disease has been known for centuries. The earliest writings on the subject were published in the 15th century. Dr. Wade stressed the importance of bringing this subject to the light of day and discussing it with the purpose in mind of bringing it under control. A discussion of symptoms of each of the three stages of the disease was given. Dr. Wade also drew a vivid picture of the results in many untreated cases.

A two-reel silent film, loaned by the state board of health, was shown to the group and served to fix in the minds of those present the importance of routine blood tests for everyone. The picture also gave statistics regarding the incidence of the disease, methods of treatment and also showed some of the victims in the third or final stage of the disease.

The next meeting of the association will be held Saturday, March 8, at the time of the Douglas county O. S. T. A. rally. At that time a special speaker will be secured for the program.
