Nazi Thrust in Balkans To Aid Italy Foreseen

for German troops to get at Greece or Turkey.

LONDON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The British government announced tonight that it had broken off diplomatic relations with Rumania.

The announcement said Germany "is building up in Rumania all the elements of an expeditionary force."

It declared that Rumanian territory is being used by Germany "as a military base in furtherance of her plans for prosecuting the war."

The statement added that the German measures were being taken "without a word of dissent" from the Rumanian government and that the position of the British legation in Bucharest had become "impossible."

RED SEA PORT TAKEN IN BRITISH AFRICAN DRIVE

CAIRO, Egypt, Feb. 10.—(AP)—British forces, launching a new drive against Italy's east African colony of Eritrea from the north, have occupied the Red sea port of Mersa Taclal and the town of Korora, on the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan frontier, the middle east command announced today.

The drive, apparently coordinated with the one sweeping eastward across Eritrea in a vast pincer movement, brought the fall of the first Red sea port to be captured from the Italians. Mersa Taclal is 40 miles down the coast from the Sudan-Eritrean border and Korora is 40 miles to the northwest on the frontier.

Tripoli Next Goal

Advance British mechanized forces, skirting the Gulf of Sidra beyond Bengasi, are reported almost one-third of the 600 miles to Tripoli, and military observers saw increasing indications today they might drive on for a showdown fight with Italy's last north African forces.

(Giovanni Ansaldo, editor of Il Telegrafo of Leghorn, said yesterday Marshal Graziani might fight it out with the British along a defense line at the edge of the desert east of Tripoli, perhaps with strong reinforcements from Italy.)

Six Generals Bagged In the cleanup around Bengasi, the British reported capturing an army commander, a corps commander and five other generals, along with "many thousands of prisoners."

One of the commanders, the British said, was Gen. Annibale Bergonzoli—who previously slipped out of British hands at Bardia.

The fiery little Bergonzoli is known as Gen. Electric Whiskers to British troops because of his beard.

ITALIANS LOSE PLANES IN RAIDING GREEK AREAS

ATHENS, Feb. 10.—(AP)—Greek reports said today that 12, and possibly 15, Italian planes were shot down yesterday by British and Greek fighters during widespread fascist air raids.

This was called the largest toll of Italian planes for any day since the outbreak of the war last Oct. 28. Improving weather over the Albanian battlefield has stepped up the pace of aerial warfare.

Besides sky battles over the front line regions of Tepeleni and Kilsura, in Albania, Greek reports said the Italians bombed the Greek cities of Salonika, Patras, Ioannina and Preveza and two areas in the Peloponnese islands. There were some casual-

ties, it was said, but no military damage.

No Greek aerial losses were reported.

and Henry Semon (D-Klamath). Third (Multnomah county) district—Frank J. Lonergan, republican, vice chairman; Stanhope Pier, republican, and Richard L. Neuberger, democrat.

At large—John Steelhammer (R-Marion), chairman; J. D. Perry (D-Multnomah). Both, however, live in the first district.

Overtime Session Looms The legislature reconvened after a week-end adjournment today, veteran legislators agreed that the week's activities probably would determine the session's length.

Experienced observers predicted the session would last at least 50 or 55 days, pointing out that more than 500 bills already have been introduced in the two houses.

Among new bills scheduled for introduction today or tomorrow was one dealing with "civil rights" for negroes. A similar measure was passed by the senate in 1939 but defeated in the house.

Rep. Allan Carson (R-Marion) indicated that he might ask that Oregon's teachers' salaries be boosted from a minimum of \$85 a month to \$100 a month for 12 months.

Sabotage Bill Passed

The senate today passed 23 to 7 and sent to the house a bill by Sen. Rex Ellis (R, Umatilla) to provide 10 years in prison or \$10,000 fine for any person who sabotages any rearmament industry or any military establishment.

Ellis explained the bill is intended to "protect the laboring man in the factory and the soldier who carried the gun, and is not aimed to protect the economic royalists or the communists."

The bill by Senator Ellis to give 10-year prison terms or \$10,000 fine to any person who advocates overthrow of the government by force was referred to the senate judiciary committee today to determine whether the measure is constitutional.

The senate voted 13 to 12 to reconsider it. Ellis said the measure was aimed at "throwing all the communists in jail."

The house passed and sent to the senate a measure to permit the state board of health to make free blood tests and furnish medicine for treatment of syphilis, regardless of whether the patient can pay.

Willkie Still Supports U. S. Aid for Britain

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—(AP)—Wendell L. Willkie is back from England still unchanged in his conviction that peace for America lies in aiding the embattled British empire.

"If we do give aid to Britain, we are likely to stay out of war," he said yesterday, "while if we do not give aid to Britain, we shall probably become involved in war."

Willkie plans to present his full conclusions to the senate foreign relations committee tomorrow as it nears the end of its hearings on the house-passed lend-lease bill calling for aid to Britain.

An advocate of the measure, with certain amendments, even before his trip, Willkie declared that what he saw and learned abroad had "modified" his views on how to assist England, and that he would disclose them in Washington.
