

R. H. S. Basketeers Defeat Medford, 26 to 22

Local Quintet, In Poor Form, Owes Victory to Luck

Indians, Outscored by Visitors In Field Goals, Gain Margin On Free Throw Conversions.

A bunch of tired and apparently somewhat stale Roseburg high school Indians, held together with adhesive tape and bandages, Saturday night virtually eliminated the Medford Peapickers as contenders for the district No. 4 basketball title by turning in a 26 to 22 victory. The Indians were lucky to win the game in view of the way in which they fumbled the ball, muffed passes and missed shots at the basket. In fact, they were outscored 9 to 8 in the number of field goals, but won the game on free throw conversions, tossing 10 out of 19 from the foul line while Medford converted four out of six. Medford players committed 16 personals and Roseburg players made only five.

Indians Slow to Start.

The Indians had a hard time getting started Saturday night and were trailing 5 to 2 at the end of the first quarter. However, they began to open up in the second period and were out in front 15 to 8 at half-time. The Peapickers came back on the floor after the rest period with a dogged man-to-man defense which the tiring Indians could not break through and as the game went into the last period Roseburg had only a three-point lead—22 to 19—which was cut to two points early in the last frame.

Roseburg, however, began stalling and the desperate Medford players were drawn into a number of fouls as they tried to get possession of the ball, and conversions kept the Indians out in front of the long distance basket potting by Fawcett and Reed.

The game was made much more enjoyable for fans through the installation of an electric scoreboard, a gift to the school from the Roseburg Dairy and Soda Works. The illuminated clock, operated electrically, indicated the running score, time to play and period of the game, thus enabling the fans to keep closer check on the contest. A public expression of appreciation to the donors of the scoreboard was made at half-time by Clyde Beard, principal of the school.

Title Not Yet Clinched.
Roseburg, holding eight wins against two losses, is well out in front in district standings, but can still be beaten for first place and the right to go to the state tournament. The Indians have two more games to play, meeting Ashland here on the 15th and going to Medford on the 21st. Ashland with five wins and two losses, holding second place, has five games left to play. If Roseburg can beat Ashland here next Saturday, the best Ashland then could do would be to tie the Indians. Medford with four wins and four losses and four games left to play is practically out of the race, while Grants Pass has lost eight games and has four left to play.

Trout Season To Open April 12th

The season for trout over six inches will open in western Oregon April 12 and close October 15, according to an announcement made Saturday by the Oregon State game commission. The season's opening was set for Saturday, April 12, to accommodate week-end fishermen. Bag limits will remain the same, 15 pounds or 15 fish in any one day and 30 pounds or 30 fish in seven consecutive days.

A few changes were made in the opening and closing of small streams in Douglas county, the new regulations being as follows: Open to angling: Calumet and Wolf lakes; Lake creek, outlet of Diamond lake, except that portion from the lake to point 800 yards downstream; Little Mill creek, closed to angling; Fall creek, tributary of Little river, and tributaries; that part of Calapooya creek, tributary of Umpqua river, from dam at city of Sutherlin water works downstream about 800 feet. Other closures remain the same. Diamond lake: Open season May 20 to September 20, with bag limit of five fish a day, but not more than 20 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Washington State Strengthens Conference Lead by Taking Idaho, 55 to 47.

Two basketball games in Seattle Friday and Saturday may well be the tie-off of the northern division championship in the Pacific coast conference. The two games will pit Washington State college, fresh from seven straight victories, against the University of Washington, undefeated in league play on its home floor this season. The two teams have not met this year, and the winner of the series could easily be the champion of the division.

At the moment, Washington State is unchallenged leader of the division, after a 55-47 clincher victory over Idaho Saturday night. Washington, despite four straight losses on the road, is tied for second with Oregon State, which dropped a one-point decision to Oregon, 36-35, in their private backyard war Saturday, both the Washington and Oregon State battling 500, with four victories and four losses each. Oregon kept in the race with its Saturday victory, and now has four wins against six losses.

At Eugene, Hank Anderson entered the Oregon lineup with the score tied and a minute and a half left to play in the overtime. It was just long enough for him to sink the winning goal. Anderson made the same sort of a pay-off shot last week in helping to defeat Washington during the closing seconds of a tied game. Oregon State attempting to make up for a defeat by Oregon earlier in the season, held a 17-10 lead at half time but was tied, 29-29, with three minutes left to play, and again, 31-31, just before the end of the regular playing period.

This week's schedule, in addition to the Seattle games, pits Idaho against Oregon Friday and Saturday at Eugene.

struction, it was necessary for the fighting ships—comprising about 100,000 tons of naval might—to thrust into the heart of the Gulf of Genoa, through the Mediterranean and Ligurian seas.

"ENORMOUS DAMAGE" TO GENOA IS ADMITTED

ROME, Feb. 10.—(AP)—At least 72 persons were killed and 226 injured in the British naval bombardment of Genoa, northwestern Italian port, at dawn yesterday, the Italian high command reported today.

The shelling caused "enormous damage" to dwellings, it said. The high command's communiqué reported that Italian warplanes overtook the British ships yesterday and hit a cruiser at the stern with a bomb.

British shells failed to hit any military objective in Genoa, the high command declared.

It said a thick haze at daybreak shielded the ships for the bombardment, to which two Italian shore batteries gave a quick reply.

Attacks by British planes yesterday on Leghorn and the outskirts of Pisa, the high command said, were without damage.

Anti-aircraft batteries shot down one plane, it said. (The British acknowledged the loss of one plane.)

NAZI HAMMER BRITISH AIRPORT AND CONVOY

BERLIN, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The German airforce, in two far-reaching thrusts, was reported today to have attacked a British airport at Reykjavik, Iceland, and sunk 24,500 tons of merchant shipping off the coast of Portugal.

(Reykjavik is approximately 1,000 miles from German air bases in Norway. The ships attacked in the Atlantic were said to have been approximately 300 miles off the Portuguese coast.)

(British forces occupied Iceland last May after Germany had seized control of Denmark; Iceland and Denmark were linked by common allegiance to the Danish king. Canadians make up a large proportion of the British force in Iceland.)

The ships attacked were said to have been in a convoy "protected by warships."

Besides the 24,500 tons reported sunk, four other ships were damaged and the convoy was dispersed, the high command reported.

ed to \$1,300,000,000.

2. The president could not make contracts under the program after June 30, 1943, and those contracts could not run beyond June 30, 1946.

3. Congress could withdraw any of the president's authority under the bill by passing a concurrent resolution, which would not require his signature.

4. The bill could not be construed to authorize use of American naval vessels for convoy purposes or for entry of American ships into combat zones in violation of the neutrality act.

5. The president would have to consult with army and navy heads before disposing of any
