

South Umpqua CCC Wins Praise For Safety Mark

A two-year safety record has won high commendation for the South Umpqua Falls CCC camp, company No. 2904. Major General Ernest D. Peek, commanding the ninth corps area, in a citation received at the Medford district headquarters, points out that the company operated with no lost time accidents throughout 1939 and 1940.

"The corps area commander," General Peek wrote, "commends the commanding officer, his assistants, the technical service personnel and the enrollees of this company for the achievement of this splendid record."

"The excellence of the safety program conducted in this company is emphasized by the fact that only one other organization of the total of 321 companies serving in the ninth corps area had a comparable record with regard to lost-time accidents during the years 1939 and 1940.

"It is hoped that an equally splendid safety program will extend this fine record to include the current year."

Copy to Commander, A copy of the general's letter was sent to the South Umpqua Falls company commander by Lieut. Col. Paul H. Welland Medford district commander, with this notation:

"It is with pride and great satisfaction that I forward this commendation."

"It is felt that the entire district will be glad to know that the splendid record at Camp South Umpqua Falls has again been recognized in an official communication by the corps area commander and for that reason a copy of this correspondence will be published to the entire district."

Camp South Umpqua Falls is administered by the Umpqua national forest of which V. V. Harpam is supervisor. Camp commander is Theodore H. Ebert, project superintendent, John R. Montgomery. The camp's post-office address is Tiller.

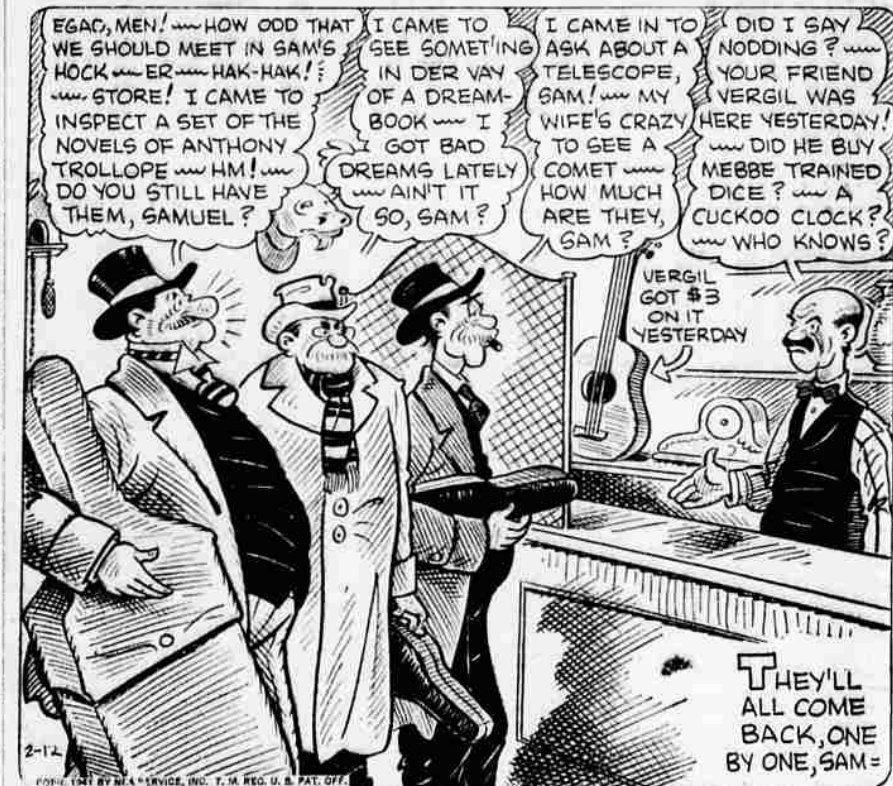

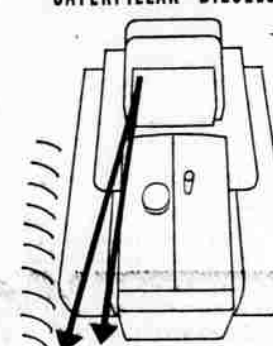

Stream Muddying Held Law Breaking If Damage Dealt

The district attorney has power under Oregon law to file criminal charges against mining concerns or other persons or organizations emptying mud, silt or other matter into a stream in the event sufficient proof is given that the waste matter is causing damage to persons using the water for domestic or irrigation purposes, according to an opinion received today from Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle.

District Attorney J. V. Long reports that he has received several complaints that mud from Cow creek and the South Umpqua river, caused by placer mining on Cow creek is resulting in injury to certain residents using water from the streams, and that further damage is apt to result if the condition is continued during the period when irrigation is begun in the spring.

Mr. Long stated that he requested from the attorney general an opinion whether criminal charges could be brought against persons responsible for emptying the mud into the stream and was informed today that he has such authority. However, it is pointed out, the question of whether the law is violated is a matter to be determined by the facts and that it would be necessary to prove actual damage or injury to users of the water.

In the event, however, such damage can be proven, it is possible for a person so injured to sign a criminal complaint against concerns or individuals responsible for the condition and action can be taken in the courts, the district attorney states.
