

Earl Wiard Lost To R. H. S. Quintet By Mumps Attack

Bad Luck Strikes Local Team as It Faces Crucial Battle With Ashland Hoopsters.

There was great sadness and wailing in the camp of the Roseburg Indians today as the persistent link of sickness and accident, which has blasted hopes of Roseburg high school basketball teams time and again for more than 15 years, struck again today with brutal suddenness.

Earl Wiard, most versatile player of the Indian squad and defensive strong man, was reported ill of mumps.

Roseburg has practically no reserve strength and the brunt of play in the entire season has been borne by the five players making up what is believed to be the nation's tallest prep school team. Wiard, 6 feet three inches in height, was a key man in the Indian defense system.

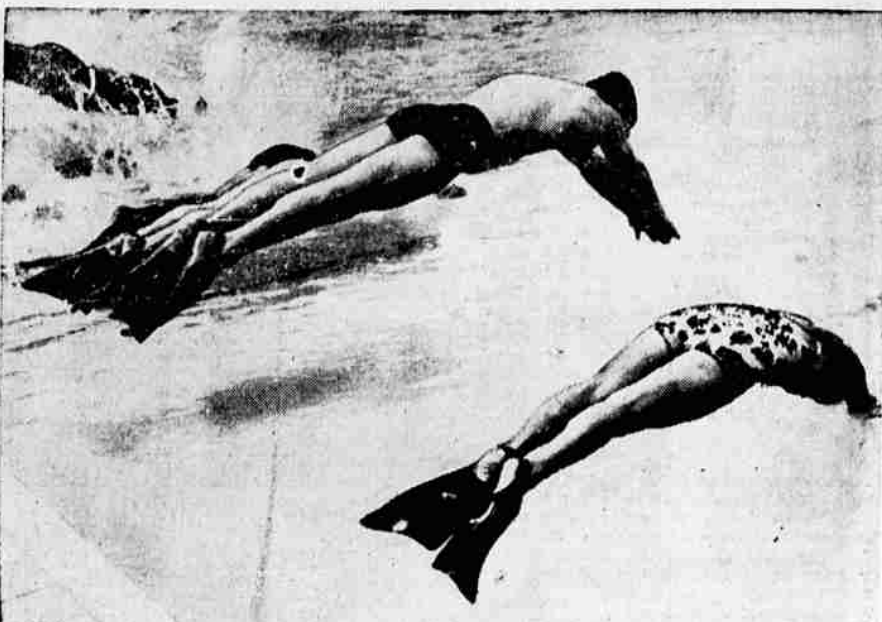
Crucial Game Faced

Now leading the southern Oregon district, the Roseburg Indians face a crucial game against Ashland here Saturday night. Each team has lost two games. Roseburg has won eight and Ashland has won five, Ashland having five games left to play and Roseburg two. If defeated at Roseburg Saturday Ashland could hope only for a tie for first place even if Roseburg should drop the one game then remaining, a contest at Medford on the 21st. Previous meetings, however, between Roseburg and Ashland have been exceedingly close battles and without the services of Wiard the Indians are in poor shape for both the Ashland and Medford games.

Repeatedly in recent years Roseburg hopes for a championship team have been dashed after the team has finished in top spot in district play only to suffer accidents or illness during tournament play-offs.

The loss of Wiard will throw the burden of the relief spot on Neil Schrimpf and Paul Cacy. Schrimpf has had flashes of brilliance as an offensive player, but being in his first year has not yet developed defensive technique to fit into Roseburg's expert type of defense play. Cacy, on

the other hand, has been an excellent defensive player and a good ball hawk, but so far has not shown up as a scoring threat.

In previous meetings Ashland has shown the smoother and faster ball club, but Roseburg's advantage in height has given the Indians victories in two out of three meetings through ability to control the ball off the backboards. Loss of Wiard's height, therefore, is apt to be a most serious handicap.

Reserves Drilled

The Indians went through workouts last night to train reserves in realigned positions and Coach Jim Watts expressed hope that the team might even yet be revamped to meet the determined Ashland threat here Saturday night. At any event, he reports, the Indians will be fighting all of the way.

A loss to Ashland would leave Roseburg's chances dependent upon the outcome of games between Ashland and Medford. Ashland has two games to play with each Medford and Grants

Pass. Victories would be anticipated over Grants Pass, which so far has not won a game and which was victim again last night, 50 to 18, in a game with Medford. On the other hand, Medford, with four losses is not entirely out of the possibility of a tie for first place and could be counted upon to give Ashland a real battle.

Paposes Dated Against Grants Pass Hoopsters

The Roseburg junior high school Paposes will play their last basketball game of the season here Friday night, when they meet Grants Pass squads in a double-header. The first game, starting at 7:30 o'clock will match the Grants Pass 8th grade team against the junior high "peanut" team. At 8:30 o'clock the Paposes will endeavor to get revenge for a 32 to 18 beating administered at Grants Pass in a game which produced remon-

strances from both sides for roughness.

Coach Hod Turner reports that the Paposes are in good shape for the game to be played at the junior high gymnasium and are hopeful of being able to wind up their season with a decisive victory.

The Roseburg B squad won an easy 32-to-6 basketball game from the Oakland Gobblers at Oakland last night. The Bees led all the way, holding Oakland to two field goals, both in the first quarter. During the balance of the game the Gobblers could not break through the Roseburg defense and all scoring was confined to shots from the free-throw line.

The Bees led 8 to 4 at the quarter, 16 to 4 at the half, 28 to 5 at the third quarter and 32 to 6 final. Reserves played a large part of the game for Roseburg.

Weekly Fish Take Limit Cut to 20 At Diamond Lake

The weekly bag limit of fish taken from Diamond lake has been reduced from 25 to 20 fish, according to 1941 regulations of the Oregon state game commission announced today. The season for the lake will again be from May 20 to September 20 and the daily bag limit will remain at five fish. However, fishermen will be allowed only 20 fish in any seven consecutive days.

The commission has ordered opening of Calumet and Wolf lakes and also has opened Little Mill creek to fishing, as well as Lake creek, an outlet of Diamond lake, except that portion from the lake to a point 800 yards downstream.

New closures by the commission in 1941 in Douglas county include Fall creek, tributary of Little river, and tributaries and that part of the Calapooia, tributary of the Umpqua river, from the dam at the Sutherland water works downstream about 800 feet.

The general fishing season this year will open on April 12 and close on October 15, although a later season, from May 3 to Nov. 1, has been fixed for 11 eastern Oregon counties situated in high altitudes.

Body of Late A. Andraieff To Be Brought to Roseburg

Alexander Andraieff, 40, son of Mr. and Mrs. V. Andraieff of this city and a brother of Nick Andraieff of Roseburg and Gold Beach, died Monday at Vallejo, California, where he had made his home for the past 10 years. He had been engaged as a building contractor at Vallejo. He came to Roseburg with his parents 29 years ago and graduated from Roseburg high school. Surviving are his widow, parents and brother. Services were held at Vallejo Tuesday and the body is to be brought to Roseburg for burial. Arrangements for services here have not yet been completed.

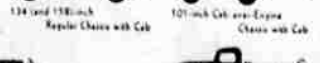
