British-Aid Bill Sent To Floor of Senate

mit the president to transfer, lease or lend war materials to nations whose defense the president considers vital to the security of the United States. Transfers of existing equipment would be limited to \$1,300,000,000 and could be made by the president only after consultation with army and navy chiefs.

The measure also would authorize the repair or re-outfitting of belligerent ships in American yards and would permit the president to communicate "defense information" to warring "democracies."

No appropriation is included in the measure, but the president is expected to ask funds for its operation immediately if it is enacted.

Under the committee-approved bill, he also could obtain congressional authority from time to time to make future contracts. Funds for these contracts would be requested after they were made.

The legislation would expire July 1, 1943, and all contracts executed under it would terminate by July 1, 1946.

Among other so-called congressional "safeguards" written into the measure was a provision giving congress power to terminate operation of the bill at any time by a majority vote, a clause requiring presidential progress reports every 90 days and a statement that nothing in the act should authorize American naval convoys of war material shipments or the entry of United States vessels into combat zones.

Dewey Supports Bill But support for the legislation came from Thomas E. Dewey, New York district attorney who,

like Taft, was an unsuccessful contender for last year's republican presidential nomination.

Dewey told a Washington, D. C., audience that he favored the bill, with some "necessary further reservations."

Willkie, in his first speech since returning from a flying trip to the British Isles, denied that "the democratic way of life" could perish in Britain and Europe and survive in the United States.

He paid tribute not only to Abraham Lincoln and George Washington, but to Robert E. Lee, hero of the south, as well. He called them "the three great figures of our public life" who in common had the quality of "magnanimity."

Willkie Raps New Deal While Willkie called for cooperation with the administration's aid-to-Britain program, he voiced bitter criticism of its domestic policies.

He charged that "the new deal party" seeks to win elections by "government pressures and expenditures" and declared it "does not understand the basic functioning of the free enterprise system."

McMINNVILLE, Feb. 13.—(AP)—A truce in republican opposition to President Roosevelt was asked here last night by Governor Sprague.

He advised the G. O. P. in a Lincoln day speech to "support our president during this critical period," although adding that republicans should not "relinquish vigilance or independent judgment."

He recommended a program of taxation to meet armament costs, saying, "republicans should not let the accelerated spending under the defense program wear them away from sound principles of finance."

MONTEREY, Calif., Feb. 13.—(AP)—Ten-year-old Laddie, his canine heart weakened by grief, died today at the Monterey presidio—four days after the 2,000-mile flight which brought him to his beloved master.

Dr. R. I. Lovell, veterinarian for the 7th division at nearby Fort Ord, said the airedale's death was due to heart collapse and old age.

Private Everett Scott, whose leaving of a Chanute, Kan., farm caused Laddie to begin a self-imposed fast broken only Monday when the two were reunited, was on duty at Fort Ord when the heart of his faithful friend ceased to beat.

Huge Fund Requested to Strengthen Pacific Bases

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—(AP)—The navy placed renewed emphasis on strategic west Pacific bases today in a multi-million dollar program for strengthening facilities at Guam, Samoa, Midway Wake and Palmyra islands.

An immediate \$46,943,050 was asked from congress to improve these distant outposts for aircraft, submarines or fleet operations, and another \$27,858,500 was sought for the bases in Alaska

where the continent extends toward Asia.

President Roosevelt placed the program before congress yesterday as part of a \$898,392,932 request for strengthening the navy's efficiency afloat and ashore.

Two Salem Boys Drown When Canoe Overturns

SALEM, Feb. 13.—(AP)—Police dragged the Willamette river today for the bodies of Robert Case, 17, and his brother Kenneth, 20, whose canoe overturned near here yesterday.

Frank Vinson, tugboatman, said he saw the two boys struggling in the water a few minutes after they had cast off from a log raft he was towing.

They were the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Irving Case, Jr., Salem.
