Lakes Area in Fine Shape for Sports

Fine conditions for winter sports and sight seeing prevail in the upper Cascade area and probably will continue over the week-end unless new storms are en-counter, according to V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua national forest. Mr. Harpham was informed in reports received today that the weather at Crater lake is clear and cold. Minimum temperature was 8 degrees this morning. The snow depth is 128 inches, which includes 10 inches of soft dry snow offering fine skiing over the week-end.

Diamond lake reported a tem-perature of 6 degrees this morn-ing with 44 inches of well packed snow at the lodge. The snow level at the west side of the lake, in the area occupied by the summer homes, was reported at five feet.
