U. S. Debt Boosting Bill Signed by Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Legislation raising the federal debt limit to \$65,000,000 and making future government securities fully taxable became law yesterday with President Roosevelt's signature. It is effective March 1.

The former debt limit was \$45,000,000,000, plus a \$4,000,000,000 authority for defense borrowing.
