

Questionnaires In Registration Of Vets Arrive

A shipment of questionnaires for the local registration, Saturday, February 22, of members of the American Legion and other world war veterans here, for national defense purposes, reached Umpqua post, No. 16, today.

Post Commander James Young announced that all arrangements have been completed to register every local Legionnaire and world war veteran if possible. The local registration is part of the nationwide program of the American Legion to catalog the qualifications and talents for future possible home defense service of all Legionnaires and war veterans. The registration is to be entirely voluntary. There is nothing compulsory about it.

The registration will provide local posts everywhere, their department headquarters, and national headquarters of the American Legion with complete indexes of the qualifications, experience, education and special training of every member and war veterans in general. These indexes will constitute a vast pool of American Legion resources in manpower and potential abilities that will enable the government to draw upon it for national defense purposes according to its needs.

"We know that practically unanimously American world war veterans will welcome this opportunity of placing themselves in a position of serving their country and community in case of an existing emergency requiring such service," Commander Young said.

"It is considered that the vast reservoir of practical experience existing within the membership of the American Legion and the potential utilization of this experience, should be cataloged in such a manner that the information contained therein will be readily available to the leadership of the American Legion, should the need for our services be made evident by the constituted authorities of the federal, state and local governments.

"We appreciate that the voluntary accomplishment of the registration provided by the use of the questionnaire forms will be a task of great magnitude and that its completeness will be dependent upon the loyal cooperation of every local Legionnaire and world war veteran."

Swine Feeders Day, Gilt Sale Planned at O. S. C.

The annual swine feeders' day and bred gilt sale conducted by the experiment station at Oregon State college will be held this year Saturday, February 22, on the campus at Corvallis.

The forenoon period starting at 10 o'clock will be devoted to a program featuring reports on experimental work in swine production in 1940. A. W. Oliver, swine specialist at the college, and H. A. Lindgren, extension animal husbandman, will be the principal speakers on this program and will be prepared to answer questions of growers.

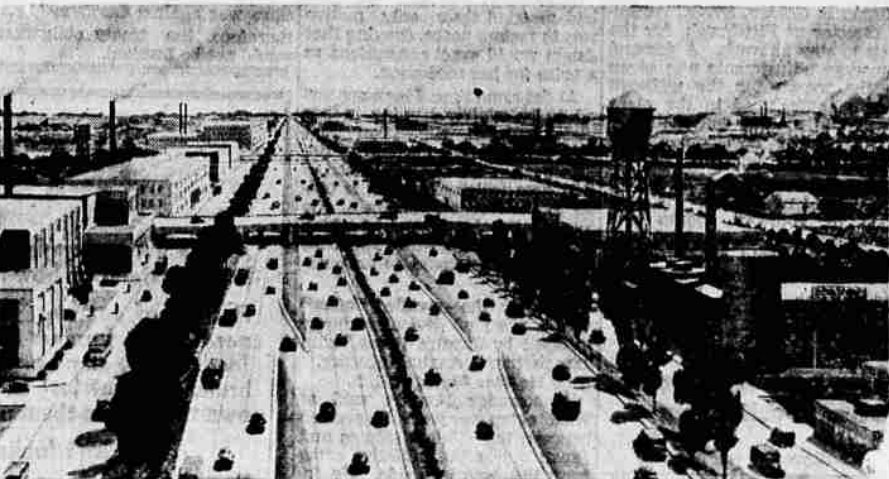

Roseburg Student Given Staff Sergeant Rating

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Feb. 20.—Frank L. Wells of Roseburg, senior in chemical engineering at Oregon State college, was rated as staff sergeant by Captain Harry L. Beard, leader of the Oregon State ROTC band, who made cadet appointments for positions on the band recently. Eighteen men were given officer's rank, chosen from the 65 members of the organization.

Two bands make up the total ROTC band unit, playing athletic games and at ROTC cadet corps ceremonies. The first band makes weekly radio broadcasts over KOAC, and as another important duty makes tours to high schools throughout the state.

Nation's Greatest Defense Highway Projected Along Militarily Vital Atlantic Seaboard



Ground may soon be broken for the nation's greatest defense highway—a \$250,000,000, 400-mile, 12-lane express artery between Boston and Washington which will pass through America's greatest concentration of industry. Proposed more than a year ago, the super-highway awaits only okay from federal authorities and the seven states it will traverse. The sketch above shows how it would look according to New Jersey state highway commission plans. Although it will have 12 lanes for its full length, from Camden to north of Perth Amboy, it would be elevated, and flanked by 40-foot marginal roads. The 12 lanes include six in the center for express traffic and six on the outside for commercial and slow traffic. Map at left, shows course of highway.

Roosevelt Signs Trespass Warning On U. S. Sea Bases

WASHINGTON, D.C. Feb. 19.—(AP)—President Roosevelt posted around American naval outposts in the Pacific and Caribbean yesterday this warning to foreign ships and planes: keep out unless you have permission from the United States navy to enter.

The president accomplished this by signing an order creating "defensive sea areas" and "air space reservations," which no vessels or planes excepting public ones of this country may enter without authority of Secretary Knox.

Mr. Roosevelt's action, to become fully effective 90 days from February 14, will extend naval control of ship and plane movements beyond a harbor which had been previously declared closed. The newly affected areas extend three nautical miles to sea around Culebra Island, east of Puerto Rico; Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii, site of a new naval air station; Kiska and Unalaska islands off Alaska; and Palmyra, Johnston, Midway, Wake, Kingman Reef, Rose, Tutu-

ila and Guam islands in the Pacific.

Harbors which foreign vessels were heretofore forbidden to enter without authority of the navy included Great Harbor, Culebra; Guantanamo Bay, Cuba; Pearl Harbor, the navy's great fortress in Hawaii; the harbor of Guam; Subic Bay, in the Philippines; Kiska Harbor, and the Long Beach-San Pedro area off the California coast, where the fleet has an anchorage.

The order was made effective 90 days from February 14, in order to provide time for notification of foreign governments.

Ascap Assents To \$24,000 Fines To Quash Trust Suit

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—(AP)—The directors of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers today agreed to a consent decree providing for payment of \$24,000 in fines, thus paving the way for settlement of the federal government's anti-trust action against the organization.

Although ASCAP officials refused to comment, it was learned that the government had agreed to dismiss the criminal action now pending in federal court at Milwaukee, Wis., and to substitute a superseding civil action here.

In anticipation of the board's approval, a meeting of the general ASCAP membership at which the agreement would be submitted for ratification, was called for tomorrow.

The principal terms of the proposed consent decree, a responsible source disclosed, were:

The exclusive agency provisions of ASCAP to be modified to permit a member to license any of his works to any individual or

company; ASCAP also to retain licensing power.

No member, however, to license his works to Broadcast Music, Inc., opposing organization set up by the broadcasters at the beginning of this year, when the nation's music war started.

All money received by the individual member licensing his work to be paid to ASCAP, to go into its general fund and be dispersed under rules of the society.

Membership qualifications to be lowered to that any individual having one song, regularly published, might belong. Existing rules call for a minimum of five songs.

WPA Projects in Four Counties Employ 1,350

EUGENE, Feb. 19.—(AP)—A total of 1350 men and women are now employed on 29 WPA projects in Lane, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties, District Manager John J. O'Farrell said.

There are 13 projects in Lane county, 7 in Douglas, 6 in Coos, and 3 in Curry. O'Farrell declared the selective service law would not materially affect the WPA rolls, as only three per cent of the workers are within the age brackets of the military law.
