The annual Douglas county B league tournament was scheduled to open at 4 p. m. today with basketball playoffs scheduled for the senior high school gymnasium and volleyball at the junior high room. The tournament brings together the first and second place winners from each of the four districts of the county for the championship elimination series.

The basketball teams emerging as numbers one, two and three in the county tournament will be entered in competition with teams from Cook, Curry and Deschutes county February 23 and March 1 at Roseburg, with the winner in the state district tournament to go to Ashland to play for the state B championship.

The B league tournament games are expected to furnish plenty of excitement. Following the first round today, the semi-finals will be played Friday and consolation and finals will be played Saturday.

Camas Valley went into the volleyball tournament in place of Wilbur as the result of a play-off of a protested game. The play-off was held on the neutral Lookingglass floor where the Camas Valley girls won by a score of 32 to 11. Previously the teams had met at Wilbur, where an error in timekeeping was charged. Although the game was declared by the referee to have been forfeited to Wilbur, team and school officials arranged to replay the match.
