Roseburg Indians Lose to Medford Quintet, 22 to 20

Locals' Only Chance to Stay in Race Now Depends on Result of Medford-Ashland Battle.

The Roseburg Indians had only a very slim chance today of remaining in the southern Oregon district basketball race after dropping a spectacular defensive game last night at Medford 22 to 20.

Roseburg's chances hang on the outcome of the game to be played next Friday between Ashland and Medford at Ashland. If Medford wins the conference would be thrown into a three way tie. On the other hand, a victory by Ashland would win the title for that team. Another very remote possibility is that Ashland might be beaten at Grants Pass Tuesday, although Grants Pass, so far has not won a game this season.

In last night's game at Medford both teams played strictly defensive games. The defensive play was so close that neither team was able to toss a field goal during the entire first period and Roseburg was ahead 1 to 0 at the end of the quarter by virtue of a free throw conversion by Finlay.

The game remained a nip-and-tuck affair all of the way, with Medford leading 11 to 8 at half-time and 17 to 15 at the three-quarter mark.

Reserves Used

Lacking the services of Earl Ward, whose loss because of mumps during the critical closing period of the tight conference play has been a most severe blow, Coach Watts tossed two of his next year's squad into the fray for their first experience under fire. Wimberly and Tony Anderson, who have been stars on the Roseburg B squad and who will undoubtedly be regulars next year, turned in a very creditable performance. Schrimpf and Hughes, in the latter the high point man in last night's game, will probably form the nucleus of next year's team as Ward, Goodlow, Denton and Finlay will be lost by graduation.

Basketball interest was raised this season to its greatest height in Roseburg for several years, and the Indians have pleased local fans. Stricken by the oft-recurring last-minute jinx of illness and injury, the Indians now are in a tough spot on championship honors, which undoubtedly would have been theirs otherwise. The lack of reserve material to meet such emergencies was the team's sole weakness.

Future Prospects Eyed

Fans looking ahead to next year foresee another unusually strong team.

In addition to the players already named, who have had a great deal of experience this year on the regular string and with the Roseburg Bees, other prospects include Denny, Fisher, Harold Cacy, Ness, and others, while graduation from junior high will bring Vincent, Cummings, Stephens, Wiley and Loomis, all promising prospects, into the picture and will assure ample and rugged material for not only next season, but the following year as well.

Despite last night's defeat at Medford, local fans were well pleased by the battle staged by the Indians. In the event a three-way tie should develop, which remains as Roseburg's only chance at the title, the Indians should be in a good position to win, as Ward by that time will be able to rejoin the team, and the players will have rested from their strenuous schedule and should be in good shape.

Titular Battle Matches Yoncalla, Reedsport Teams

Tournament Survivors Reach Decisive Game After Easy Triumphs Over Rivals.

Two strong teams, Reedsport, winner of the coastal title, and Yoncalla, champions of the northern division, will battle tonight for the County B league basketball championship as a result of exciting victories over Lookingglass and Elkton in the semi-final rounds yesterday in the three-day county tournament.

The teams have earned their way to the titular joust by surviving grueling opening and semifinal rounds of play. Yoncalla won its first game from Days Creek 27 to 26 and downed Elkton last night 36 to 31. Reedsport won the right to play in the finals by walloping Drain 43 to 24 and winning last night from Lookingglass 41 to 22.

Teams defeated last night play today against the victors of the consolation round Friday afternoon, Elkton being pitted against Drain and Days Creek against Lookingglass. The winners meet tonight at 8:30 o'clock for third place in county standings.

Two teams were eliminated Friday afternoon from further competition in the tournament when Camas Valley lost a heart-breaker to Days Creek 29 to 38 and Myrtle Creek was swamped 53 to 19 by a strong Drain team.

The victories of Yoncalla and Reedsport last night, while running true to form, were surprisingly easy. Reedsport's fast breaks enabled them to run up a large early margin and then coast for the remainder of the contest while reserves carried on the battle. Lookingglass was hopelessly outclassed from the start.

Yoncalla, while clearly superior to Elkton as a team, had plenty of trouble with diminutive Paul Anderson, who tallied 15 points. The Yoncalla victory was made possible by the fine play of Norman Main and Earl Howard, although Main was suffering from a cold and Howard saw nearly half the game from the bench as the result of three personal fouls in the first quarter. Main suffered an ankle injury and was taken out for about half of the game.

Tonight's struggle between Reedsport and Yoncalla will renew a rivalry in which honors so far are even, Reedsport holding a 37 to 26 win over Yoncalla in their first meeting this year, while Yoncalla took the second meeting 17 to 12.

Other highlights yesterday included the individual scoring by Jim Kirk of Drain and Jim Ward of Days Creek. Kirk and 12 field goals and two free throws for 26 points, running his total points for the tournament to 41. Ward had 10 field goals and five free throws to make 25 points and a total of 42 for tournament play.

Yoncalla 36, Elkton 31

The battle yesterday between Yoncalla and Elkton, was the most exciting of the tournament to date, Yoncalla winning 36 to 31. Reinforced by the return of Glenn Cox, stellar forward, who has been absent because of injury, the Eagles took an early lead but were closely pressed all of the way. Anderson and Griffith for Elkton rallied time and again to threaten Yoncalla but the Eagles had an edge in reserve strength and managed to stay out in front.

Reedsport 41, Lookingglass 22

Reedsport's fast breaking, ball-hawking style of play was too much for the Lookingglass team which went down to defeat 41 to 22. Lookingglass, although having the tallest team of the tournament, was unable to keep pace with the speedy Reedsport Braves who ran up a 25 to 10 lead at half time and then substituted freely to coast the rest of the way.

Days Creek 39, Camas Valley 38

Led by the sharpshooting Jim Ward, who tallied 25 of his team's 39 points, Days Creek won the consolation thriller Friday afternoon from Camas Valley. The game was nip and tuck all of the way with Days Creek leading 9 to 8 in the first quarter but trailing 17 to 20 at half-time. The second half, particularly the last few minutes, was played in a frenzy of excitement with Days Creek scoring the winning basket when Camas Valley attempted to stall to protect its one-point lead.

President Roosevelt would "exercise" that power so long as a majority of the people opposed war, but he declared at another point in his address, Secretary of War Stimson and Secretary of the Navy Knox had been appointed to the cabinet "because they were for war."

"The truth is," he said, "that these gentlemen have always been for war. Secretary Knox has been in favor of conveying ships through the war zone ever since the war started in September, 1939. If his policies had been followed, we would be in the war now."

"Secretary Stimson advocated convoys and the use of American bases by the British fleet in June, 1940. The truth is that both of these gentlemen were appointed because they were for war."

Declaring that he was no "Roosevelt hater," Capper said that he believed the bill was not only a "war bill" but a "dictatorship bill."

Each Side Claims Gains.

Meanwhile, both sides professed to have noted gains in their respective strength as a result of the week-long debate.
