The light opera "Trial by Jury," which is to be given at the Indian theater, Monday, March 3, as a benefit for the swimming pool fund, is one of the funniest shows ever written by Gilbert and Sullivan.

Everywhere received with the greatest delight, and enthusiasm, the comedy of this great little opera is enhanced by the story itself—the ever-appelling story of a breach of promise suit.

One of the most humorous roles of the opera is the part of the usher, which is taken by Leroy Hatt, teacher at senior high school. The usher is supposed to be a simple-minded fellow who registers a mental zero—like a potato. His sole purpose in life, he thinks, is keeping order in court; but when he looks at the girls he forgets his job, especially if the girls are pretty.

Entranced by the defendant's dance, he tries to imitate it, much to the delight of the audience who laughs at his awkward steps. When told finally by the judge that if he likes he can go to Russia or any other place far away, he dashes wildly in all directions at once, trying to discover which way he should go.

The usher has one of the heaviest acting parts in the opera. His role is brilliantly played by Mr. Hatt, who has distinguished himself in the past by his dramatic ability and fine interpretations in the art of song.

Plane With Noted Savant, Three Other Men Missing

MONTREAL, Feb. 24.—(AP)—An intensive search was under way today for a military airplane missing since Friday morning with Dr. Sir Frederick Banting, co-discoverer of insulin and one of Canada's outstanding scientists, aboard as a passenger.

Besides Sir Frederick, a major in the Canadian army, the plane carried a crew of three.

Members of the crew were: Capt. Joseph Creighton Mackey, 31, formerly a test pilot with the civil aeronautics administration in Kansas City; Navigator William Bird of Kidderminster, England; and William Snailham of Bedford, Nova Scotia.

An official announcement issued here last night described the missing aircraft only as "a military airplane being delivered by a civilian organization."

"As the rain cometh down and the snow from heaven and returneth not thither, but watereth the earth and maketh it bring forth fruit and bud, that it may give seed to the sower and bread to the eater; so shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void." In these few sentences from the great Prophet of the Exile, the rain and the snow became illustrations of the beneficent energy of the word of God. They do not return to the clouds of heaven in quite the same way as they came. Nor do they return without first finishing their work. They mingle with the earth, they water and fertilize the soil. So the word of God does not return to the unseen speaker without doing its work, as the prophet says, "It shall prosper in that whereto I sent it." The prophets of the old testament actually saw the word of God at work in the field of human history, and were themselves often brought by its influence to wonderful heights of divinely inspired speech. But the full expression of the word of God was not possible under the conditions of the Old Testament. Its full utterance came only with Jesus Christ. "In the beginning was the word, and the word was with God, and the word was God, and the word became flesh and dwelt among us." The very mind and heart of God.
