

B League Tourney Opens Here Friday

Eight Teams Of 4 Counties Seek District Crown

Winner Will Enter Contest for State Championship; Bill Also Includes Special Battle.

Basketball fans will be privileged to see some exciting games at the Roseburg senior high school gymnasium Friday and Saturday of this week when the first District B-5 tournament is held here. Eight teams, representing Douglas, Coos, Curry and Deschutes counties will meet in the championship play-off, which will carry the right of playing for state championship.

Coos and Curry counties each will be represented by their two leading B league teams. Only one team is entered from Deschutes county, while Douglas county will be represented by the three teams that won the top three spots in the county tournament held here last week.

Schedule Listed.

The tournament will start at 4 p. m. Friday with Drain and Powers paired for the first clash. Port Orford and Yoncalla will meet at 5:30 p. m. Friday. Friday night games will be held at 7:30 and 8:45 o'clock with Coos River and LaPine meeting in the first clash and Reedsport and Gold Beach in the second.

Survivors of Friday's games will meet Saturday morning, with the first game scheduled for 9 a. m. and the second for 10:15 a. m. The finals will be played at 8:45 p. m. Saturday and will be preceded by a preliminary game between the Roseburg high school Bees and the Douglas County All-Stars.

T. H. Ireland, principal of Myrtle Creek high school, who is in charge of the local arrangements, urges the cooperation of local fans as the attendance probably will determine whether future tournaments will be held in Roseburg or elsewhere. He promises that each game will furnish plenty of exciting play to interest spectators.

Stanford to Battle for Coast Basketball Crown

PALO ALTO, Calif., Feb. 27.—(AP)—Stanford's basketball team, assured that it will be able to take part in the play-off for the Pacific Coast conference cage crown, prepared today for its two final southern division games, with California Friday and Saturday nights.

The Indians, southern division champions, yesterday cleared up the conflict between their final examination period and the dates set for the play-off with the northern division winner.

The play-off will be held on the court of the northern division title-holder on March 14, 15 and 17. The northern champion is not yet determined, but Washington state is now in the lead. The winner of the series will compete in the national collegiate championship March 20-29, in Kansas City, Mo.

Two-Thirds of Oregon's Selectees Meet Test

SALEM, Feb. 26.—(AP)—Two-thirds of the 3,604 men who have been examined for the selective service program have been found physically fit for general military service, state selective service headquarters said today.

Only 16.8 per cent were limited for limited military service, and 16.9 per cent were found physically unfit for any military service.

The greatest single reason for being disqualified from general military service was bad teeth, followed by deformities, bad vision, hernia and heart defects.

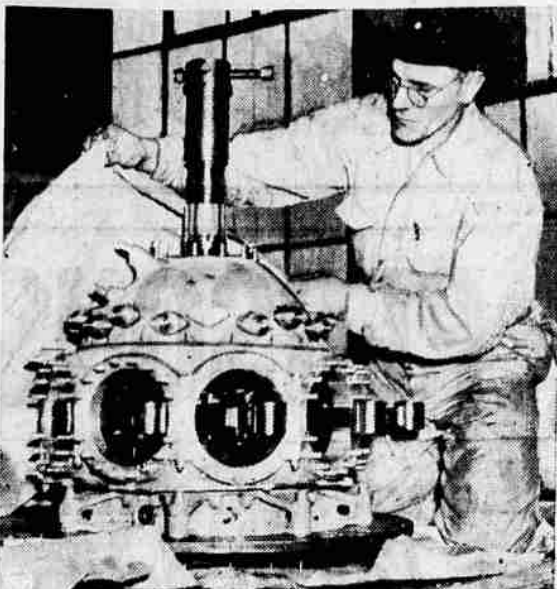
E. A. Britton has consented to operate the picture as Mr. Madden relates the interesting events of his work there.
