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Every state, county and city
official or board that handles
public money should publish at
regular intervals an accounting
of it, showing where and how
each dollar is spent. This is a
fundamental principle of demo-
cratic government.

SELDOM has a community
been so aroused over a game
as Roseburg is now about basket-
ball. We have had our ups and
downs about it too.

At the start of the season
there seemed no stopping the
Roseburg high school team. They
took eight straight games in the
southern Oregon district, then
fell into a slump and dropped
the last four of the 12 game series.

The recent illness of one of the
regular players, Earl Ward, was
a serious blow—especially so
with him out of the crucial battle
with Medford a week ago. Even
so, the Indians were downed by
only one field goal—two points—
and that in the final half minute of play.

After losing to Medford all
seemed lost. Ashland the strong
team in our district seemed to
be getting stronger—with only
two games to play, one with
Grants Pass which everyone con-
sidered a set-up because Grants
Pass has won no games, losing
eleven, and the other with Med-
ford. After a most successful
season thus far, the Ashland
team needed only to beat the
weak Grants Pass aggregation
and then take Medford to win
the district title.

But the unexpected happened.
The under dog Grants Pass team
came back with a burst of speed
and fury and—believe it or not—
took the Ashland team by a mar-
gin of three points. Basketball
is a tricky game that way. A
strong team now and then has
a slump—as witness what hap-
pened to our own Indians—and,
conversely, a weaker team some-
times turns in a most excellent
performance. Grants Pass cer-
tainly did just that Tuesday
evening.

As a result, Roseburg fans are
filled with optimism. No mat-
ter what happens now, the In-
dians will have another chance
to take the district title. If Ash-
land had beaten both Grants
Pass and Medford, Ashland
would have gone to the state
tournament. Now, however, the
winner of the game to be played
tonight between Medford and
Ashland will be tied with Rose-
burg for first place.

Thus an exciting high school
basketball series ends with the
highest of all possible excitement—
two excellent teams tied and
a playoff on a neutral floor
necessary. That should be a con-
test well worth going the many
crooked miles to see.

Apparently Ward has recovered
from his unfortunate illness.
Apparently, also, the other reg-
ulars are in shape and eager
for the big chance.

Whether you are a basketball
fan or not, take a tip from one
who has seen several of the
games this season: Plan to see
this final big championship tuss-
le—and be on hand to yell for
the home team. But plug your
ears with cotton—and stay at
home if you have a weak heart.

OBVIOUSLY these vast activi-
ties mean spending money.
Not piker money. The last guess

this writer saw placed the
amount of defense funds already
committed in California at
around 200 million dollars. And
that was some time ago.

The total is undoubtedly much
higher by this time, for it is be-
ing added to daily by new pro-
jects.

EQUALLY obvious, the pouring
in of these vast sums is af-
fecting the general business con-
dition here. Business is on the
up.

City business, that is, the
farmer, here as elsewhere,
doesn't appear to be any better
off than usual. Citrus growers
are about as low in their minds
as this writer has ever seen them.
Oranges are more or less
a drug on the market, and grape-
fruit is worse.

But the cities are perking up.
Anyone with half an eye can
see that. And the river of de-
fense spending hasn't even be-
gun to reach its flood.

ARE business people happy
over this?

The answer is flat and unmis-
takable. It is NO! If new oil
wells were coming in every day
with demand for oil exceeding
supply, if the movie business
were booming in a big way with
the public clamoring for more
pictures, if new gold mines were
being discovered and opened up,
if the plane factories were
swamped with orders for new
COMMERCIAL ships, if the pro-
ducts of California's soil were
in strong demand at good prices,
it would be quite different. Every-
one would then be unreservedly
happy.

That would be ECONOMICAL.
LY SOUND development. What
is happening now is something
else.

BUSINESS people can't be said
to be objecting to what is
happening in a business way.
They are taking what is coming
as it comes. But they are not
happy about it.

Being business people, they
know it is unsound, can't last,
and in the long run will bring
lowered standards of living rather
than higher standards.

Son of King George's Aide Found Dead of Bullet

LONDON, Feb. 28. (AP)—
Lieutenant Charles Vereker, 29,
only son and heir of Lord Gort,
former commander of the Brit-
ish expeditionary force on the
continent, was found dead yester-
day in a village in southern Eng-
land with a service pistol in his
hand.

The lieutenant was one of the
last officers to be removed from
Dunkirk during the British
withdrawal last June.

His father now is inspector
general of the forces for training
and aide de camp to King George
VI.
