Merchant and naval vessels to the number of 1351 are now believed to have passed in this last review to rest stolidly on the sea bottom with the bones of 17,000 people in and around them.

Every sign indicates that even this is only a beginning. Perhaps this fleet may never be entirely replaced. By the end of this way the fleets of the air may well have made such progress that all but the heaviest freight will be moving through the stratosphere.

FROM Sofia (Bulgaria) comes a supposedly inside explanation that the Germans are trying to persuade Turkey to trade her

alliance with Britain for one with Germany, saying to the Turks: "Only Germany can protect Turkey against the historic designs of Russia."

THE British minister is expected to leave Bulgaria on Wednesday. Meanwhile it is reported that British planes have been mapping Bulgaria for days.

FROM Chinese sources comes a report (rumor might be a better word) that the Japs are seeking peace with China, where they have a bear by the tail.

SO there you have a day's rumors. They add up to the fact that in this period while the guns are comparatively quiet the diplomats are frantically busy.

What Russia is trying to do, only Stalin knows—and it's hard to escape the thought that he isn't too sure.

Collapse of Root Cellar Fatal to Ranch Woman

ONTARIO, Ore., March 5. (AP)—Mrs. Joe Watanabe, 52, was killed and Horace McMahon injured in the collapse of a rain-soaked earthen roof of a root cellar yesterday on the Watanabe ranch at Cairo, southwest of here. The pair was sorting potatoes when the roof caved in, burying them so deep that it required a half an hour for six men to dig their way through the debris. McMahon suffered three broken ribs and dislocated ankle. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Watanabe witnessed the tragedy and narrowly escaped being buried.

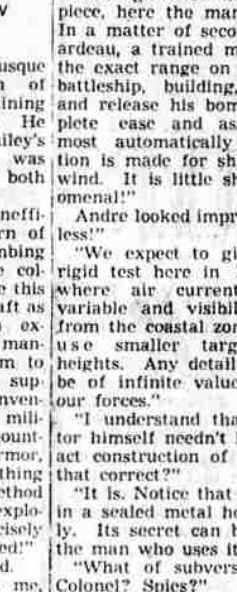
SECRET OF RAINBOW CANYON

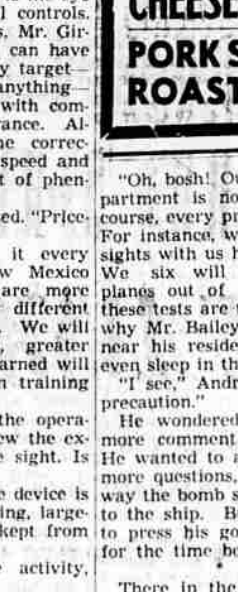
