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Sarah Schloeman Passes On at 77

Sarah Jane Schloeman, 77, died at her home in Roseburg last night following a long period of ill health. She was born Nov. 9, 1864, in the Alsea valley, Benton county, and spent the greater part of her early years in Corvallis where she met and married August A. Schloeman who died six years ago.

In 1894 Mr. and Mrs. Schloeman sold a restaurant and bakery business in Corvallis and moved to Roseburg where Mr. Schloeman again engaged in the bakery business. The bakery later was sold and they built and operated a general merchandise store at Dixonville from which they established a branch at Oak creek. Following the sale of the Dixonville store they moved to Oak creek, where they remained until 1904, when they again sold their business and moved to a farm on the East Umpqua. The farm is a part of the estate. For many years they made their home in Roseburg, residing on Mosher street.

Mrs. Schloeman was the mother of eight children of whom seven survive. They are Sidney G. and Carl W. Schloeman, Corvallis; Mrs. Charles Hurst, Stockton, Calif.; Mrs. Edmond H. Pedro, El Cerrito, Calif.; Alvin A. Schloeman, Glendale; Conrad J. Schloeman, Portland, and Mrs. E. A. McKean, Roseburg. She also leaves 12 grandchildren and one great-grandchild; also a sister, Mrs. Leslie Lilly, Corvallis, and a half-brother, W. Tom, Mouth.

Mrs. Schloeman was a very active member of the Baptist church.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Friday at the Roseburg

Burial will be in the Masonic Undertaking company chapel, Rev. H. P. Sconce officiating, cemetery.

Douglas Teachers To Receive Bibles From Gideon Assn.

At the mid-year teachers' rally to be held in Roseburg on Saturday, March 8, an opportunity will be given to each teacher to accept a fine substantial Bible with the compliments of the Gideon association of Roseburg, according to W. R. Greene, president of the Roseburg Gideon society.

Through the generous contributions of Christian people of all denominations throughout Douglas county, the Gideons have been able to finance the purchase of these Bibles, which is part of a nation-wide project undertaken by the Gideons to place Bibles in all public schools in the United States, Mr. Greene reports.

In January of this year the largest Bible dedication in the history of the Gideons took place at Atlanta, Ga.—20,000 Bibles for the schools of that state, while in 1939, California Gideons placed 11,000 Bibles in public schools. In Oregon the work is progressing rapidly.

Organized in 1899, the Gideon association has spread steadily until at this time its scope is international. The organization is composed of Christian business men and is supported entirely by the dues of members and outside contributions. As a missionary arm of the church, the Gideons have devoted over a quarter of a century to the distribution of Bibles, which have been placed in thousands of institutions in this country and abroad, and have reached and influenced the lives of countless men and women who seldom if ever attend church.
