Nazi-Abetted Revolts in South America Feared

WASHINGTON, March 6.—(AP)—Rep. Dies (D., Tex.) believes South American nations face the imminent danger of German-directed uprisings.

The chairman of the house committee to investigate un-American activities told reporters yesterday he had received reports from "reliable sources" that there are more than 1,000,000 Germans in South America "upon whom the third reich can absolutely depend."

Without specifying countries in which uprisings might occur, Dies declared that if Adolf Hitler believed it necessary to divert the United States from its defense and aid-to-Britain programs, he would start a movement which would result in the "overthrow of some of the governments in South America."

Dies said the Germans might decide to penetrate Latin America to supplement their supply of raw materials.

Reedsport Quintet Moves Closer to District Title

ASHLAND, March 7.—(AP)—Westport's defending champions pulled past Jacksonville, 30 to 28, in a rousing last-minute rally to reach the semi-finals of the state class B high school basketball tournament last night.

Westport's opponent tonight will be Arlington, winner over Alsea, 45 to 24. The Reedsport team, which downed Grant union high of John Day, 26 to 15, will face Corbett, conqueror of Lowell, 28 to 23.

In the Southern Oregon College of Education invitational tournament Chiloquin will meet Gold Hill and Powers will play Dayton in the semi-finals tonight. The championship will be settled Saturday.

Chiloquin advanced yesterday over Central Point, 37 to 23; Gold Hill beat Rogue River, 34 to 31; Powers defeated Gardiner, 49 to 34, and Dayton downed Bonanza, 36 to 29.

More Funds Requested in Defense Program Phases

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—(AP)—A \$193,913,093 appropriation, chiefly to continue the defense housing and apprentice-training programs, was recommended to the house today by its appropriations committee.

The measure also included funds to give the federal bureau of investigation 700 additional special agents—500 for anti-sabotage and other defense matters and 200 for investigation of violations of the draft law.
