If they really are sending forces to Saloniki, it must mean they are deliberately seeking to force Hitler to open up another war front.

(GUESSING again, it must mean that they place considerable confidence in the Turks. Otherwise, they would be embarking on a risky venture.)

WHATEVER else you do, keep your eye these days on the Dardanelles. Something extremely important is pretty sure to happen there sooner or later.

THIS is pure guessing: If Hitler permits himself to become involved in a major fight in the Balkans, he will be unlikely to launch his widely advertised all-out attack on England. There have been interesting rumors of late of an immensely stimulated submarine attack on British shipping. He may have decided to take it out on England in that manner.

Another guess: If Hitler gets into a fight in the Balkans, he will come up sooner or later against his alleged pal, Stalin.

TODAY'S (Wednesday's) rumor or crop indicates that German troops are keeping carefully away from the Bulgarian-Turkish border.

Germany is still hoping to buy the Turks off.

It is well to remember that since war began buying off the other fellow's prospective allies has been one of the accepted rules of the game. Rome set that fashion in a big way twenty centuries ago, and it has been going strong ever since.

When an individual sells out his associates, it is a low, dirty trick. When a nation sells its associates, it is just part of the game.

Machiavelli made that quite plain centuries ago in his cynical book "The Prince."

Harry O. Pierson, Ex-Roseburg Boy, Found Dead in Car

Harry O. Pierson, 461 Blair street, Eugene, formerly of Roseburg, was found dead in his car parked in Hendricks park, near Eugene, about nine o'clock last Wednesday morning. The engine was still running when the body was found. Death was from carbon monoxide gas, according to Charles Poole, coroner of Lane county.

A rubber garden hose carried the fumes to the driver's compartment. Ray Shore, Northwestern Christian college student, found the body and sent for an inhalator. Pierson was dead when the equipment arrived.

Pierson, an employee of the Southern Pacific company in Eugene, had been in ill health for several months and had only recently been discharged from the Southern Pacific hospital in San Francisco, following treatment for a heart ailment. He was graduated from Roseburg high school in the class of 1925. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Gladys Pierson; two children by a previous marriage, and three brothers, Percy, of Portland, and Cecil and Harlan Pierson, of Eugene. Funeral services were held this afternoon in Eugene.

"And Abraham builded an altar unto the Lord." The institution of the altar dates back to man's earliest worship of God. We read that Noah saved from the flood, offered his sacrifice of thanksgiving upon an altar which he erected. In the early times altars were usually built in certain places, hallowed by religious associations, on places where God had appeared to His servants for definite reasons and the altars became a memorial of God's mercies to man. Sometimes the altar was built for a witness to testify to generations as yet unborn the part which the fathers had in the inheritance of the Lord. A beautiful story is recorded in the Book of Joshua, when the tribes of Reuben and Gad justified themselves in the eyes of the rest of Israel by declaring that the altar which they had built was to be a witness to their children and future generations that never might it be said that they had no part in the inheritance of the Lord.
