Mrs. Bigland's book, "Into China," telling of her recent trip over the Burma road, was reviewed as the fifth book, while "Land of the Eye" by Hassaldt Davis, also telling of his experiences in the far east, was the sixth book reviewed. "Embezzled Heaven," by Franz Werfel, telling the story of a kitchen servant in pre-war Austria, followed and the reviews were closed by Mrs. Roberts' telling of Mrs. Jan Struther's collection of poems entitled, "The Glass Blower."
