Jury Convicts on One of Two Tax Evasion Counts

CHICAGO, March 8.—(AP)—A federal court jury today convicted William R. Skidmore, accused by the government of selling protection to bookmakers, of evading \$295,648 in taxes on his 1938 income. Maximum penalty on the indictment would be five years imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine.

The jury foreman told Judge Sullivan he did not believe agreement could be reached on a second indictment, which charged Skidmore, junk yard operator and country squire, with evading \$210,117 in taxes on his 1933-37 income.

The court instructed the jurors to continue their deliberations.

O. S. C. Loses To Cougars; U. of O. Loses To Huskies

(By the Associated Press)

Washington State college extended its basketball winning streak to 13 games last night at the expense of second-place Oregon State college; while the University of Washington gave notice it was still in the battle for third place in the northern division by defeating Oregon.

The score at Pullman was WSC 42, OSC 37; at Seattle, Washington 48, Oregon 37.

WSC had little trouble with Oregon State—the only team to beat the Cougars this year—although OSC held Paul Linedman to five points for the evening. Linedman usually leads the WSC scorers. Dale Gentry led the WSC attack with 12 points.

OSC went ahead at the opening of the game but the teams battled evenly from then until Linedman's only field goal broke a 22-22 tie late in the first half. WSC ended the period with a 30-26 lead and managed to stay ahead during a slow second half. The game had no effect on the division standings, since Washington State had already clinched the championship and OSC was already safe in second place.

At Seattle, Washington got back its early-season form to trounce Oregon soundly. Oregon took an early lead but was overtaken at 10:10; and Washington was ahead the rest of the way. Washington bottled Vic Townsend throughout the contest and held him to five points. Bobby Lindh, Washington guard, was high with 14 points.

The four teams put on repeat performances tonight. Again the Pullman contest can have no effect on the standings. Another victory for Washington tonight, however, will give the Huskies third place in the final ranking.

Three Roseburg Teams Enter Bowling Tourney

Three Roseburg bowling teams have entered in the annual tournament at Grants Pass and will roll their games Sunday, starting at 1 p. m. Corbett, paced by R. O'Neill and Price, who scored 14 points each, marched into the final round last night with an easy 40-18 win over Reedport.

Westport earned the other final position by humbling Arlington, 37 to 18.

Steelhead Bill Given Approval by House, 39-18

the joint committee was an effort to kill the bill.

"It is the duty of the governor," said Rep. Frank J. Loneragan (R., Multnomah), "to iron out the disputes between the game commission and the state fish commission. He should prevent disputes of this kind from ever reaching the legislature."

The bill was passed 22 to 8 by the senate several weeks ago.

A senate bill to give the state game commission power to fix seasons and bag limits was passed by the house with only six negative votes. These powers have been reserved to the legislature.

Sales Tax Plan Beaten

The two per cent retail sales tax bill, which would have been referred to the people, was rejected by the house today by a 31 to 28 vote, democrats arguing the measure placed too heavy a burden on poor people and that it would not provide immediate help to the aged.

The defeat of the bill indicates that no new tax legislation will be approved this session.

Other Bills Disposed Of

The house acted late yesterday on measures, ranging from diversion of the gasoline tax to state control of so-called "mixer clubs."

It also adopted a resolution to end the session by 11 p. m., next Tuesday. Representative Loneragan (R., Multnomah), house floor leader, explained the resolution was only a "gesture," and predicted adjournment by Thursday (60th day).

The league of Oregon cities sponsored bill to distribute five per cent of highway revenues for street maintenance was passed, 35 to 22, and sent to the senate.

By a 47-to-9 vote, the house approved a measure to give the state liquor control commission authority to regulate clubs in which drinks are mixed.

Representative Bolvin (D., Klamath) asserted that "prohibition" would be back unless the bill was passed.

A house-approved bill to require motorists to prove their financial responsibility after accidents was killed in the senate, 23 to 4, after Senator Strayer charged the measure was "drawn and intended for the benefit of the insurance business."

Other Insurance Bills

Two bills which would provide full and compulsory coverage by all employers under the workmen's compensation act were introduced by the senate's industries committee.

One would create the Oregon compensation bureau, with power to establish rates for various classifications, set up a schedule of experience rating, and hold hearings.

Members of the bureau would include a member of the industrial accident commission, the insurance commissioner and a third member appointed by the governor for a four-year term at a salary not to exceed \$5,000.

The other measure would bring private carriers and self-insurers under the law and eliminate the present elective provision.

Bridge Bill Signed

Governor Sprague signed today a bill to authorize the state highway commission to negotiate with the state of Washington in purchasing, constructing or leasing bridges across the Columbia river.

Sponsors of the bill said they hoped it would result in the states acquiring the Longview bridge, and the Bridge of the Gods near The Dalles, making them toll-free. The only free bridge on the river is between Vancouver and Portland.

The governor also signed bills providing that unless school teachers are notified of their dismissal by March 15 of any year, they are automatically rehired for the following school year; and prohibiting false published statements against candidates for public office.

Judge Retirement Loses

The house killed 30 to 28 a bill to retire circuit and supreme court judges who have 17 years' service and have reached the age of 70 and judges physically unable to carry on their duties.

Judges would have contributed two and a half per cent of their salaries and the state would

match contributions. Retired judges would have received a \$200 monthly pension for life. Sponsors of the bill said it would relieve congestion in the courts.

A bill to prohibit delivery of liquor from state liquor stores by telegraph messenger boys was passed by the house today and sent to the senate.

dent Roosevelt's desk by Monday.

"If we enact this bill in its present form, and without the amendment I have offered," Walsh declared, "we are saying to the president:

"Here is the navy, not only for you to command and operate as you see fit, but also for you to loan or sell or give away as you see fit."

House Okay Predicted

Saying he was "entirely satisfied" with the administration's consistent victories on the aid legislation yesterday, Barkley expressed to reporters the belief that the house would accept all senate amendments to the bill.

Thus, if the measure should be approved by the senate today or tonight, the house could complete congressional action Monday.

Administration leaders predicted the legislation would be approved by the senate by a vote of 2 to 1.

12 Amendments Slain

The powerful administration forces knocked down 12 proposed amendments yesterday and last night.

Only two amendments were approved in the course of the long meeting. One, presented by Senator Ellender (D-La.) as an administration compromise on the issue of sending troops abroad, provided that nothing in the aid bill should change existing law regarding movements of land and naval forces. The vote was 65 to 24. Critics called the provision "meaningless."

The other, put forward by Senator Clark (D-Mo.), an opponent of the legislation, was written in on a voice vote after Majority Leader Barkley had termed it acceptable to the administration. It substituted the words "transfer" for "title" for the word "transfer."

In a section empowering the president to supply defense articles to other nations. Proponents of the bill said the change was more or less technical.

Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.), a leading foe of the bill, conceded today that the senate would ap-

prove that legislation, adding that "the fight against war has just begun."

Wheeler declared that he would "fight harder than ever" after the measure's passage to keep the United States out of war.

Neutral military observers in Bulgaria predicted last night that German forces would drive into the Greek provinces of Macedonia and Thrace—toward vital Salonika—today or tomorrow, but any military offensive now appears to hinge on the outcome of the diplomatic maneuvers.

Hope for Turkish Aid

Greek diplomatic informants here said yesterday Greece "absolutely will fight any German invasion" and expressed hope that if the nazis did invade Greece Turkey would hit them in the flank.

Meanwhile, Germany continued to exert heavy diplomatic pressure on Turkey and Yugoslavia in an effort to swing those two nations into the axis sphere.

Some axis informants took the position that Yugoslavia was more or less a side issue, but others said locomotives, machinery and economic rewards were being offered to Turkey in return for a break with Britain.

It was apparent in Sofia that the Germans were counting heavily on the success of their diplomatic plans to end the Greek-Italian fighting, in which Greece has had all the best of it, and to win Turkey over to the axis.

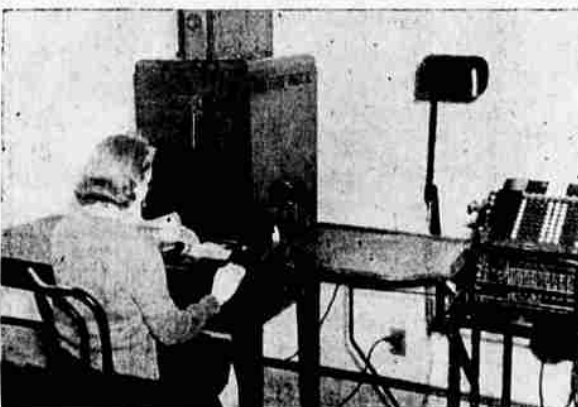
