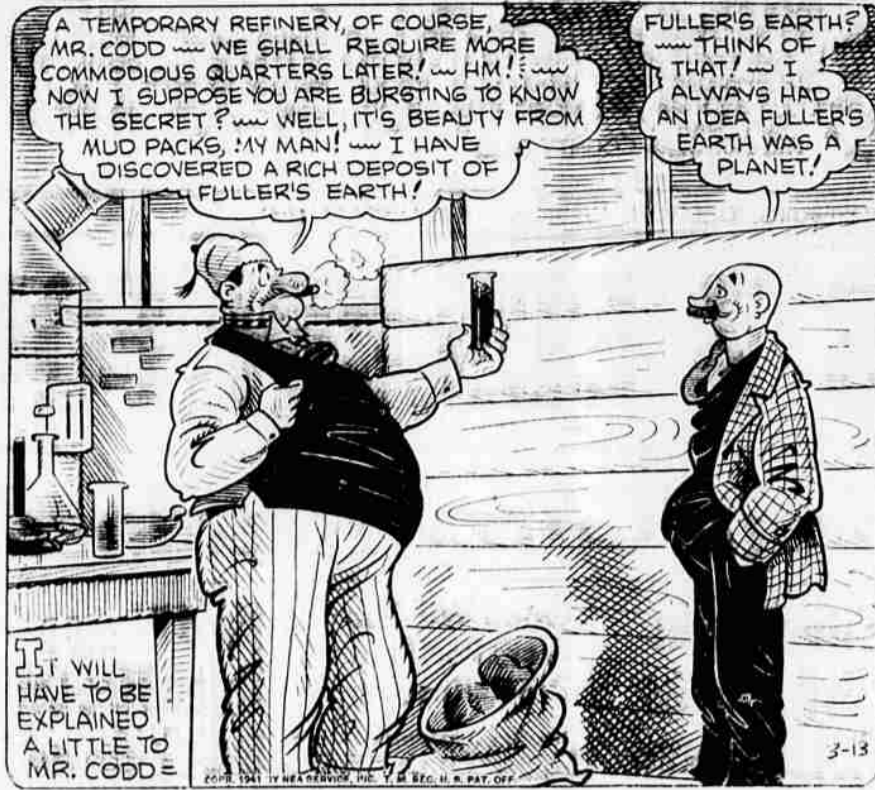

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—(AP)—An interned German sailor and his San Francisco bride continued to honeymoon apart today following their marriage Saturday.

The inspectors accompanied the newlyweds on a motor trip about San Francisco, then returned Rolfe to the immigration station. Mrs. Rolfe returned to her residence.

Rolfe said they would return to Germany after the war—"in two months." Mrs. Rolfe, of English descent, explained: "We fell in love—political matters and the war don't bother us."

Rolfe is to be transferred soon to Fort Stanton, N. M., to be interned for the duration of the war at a new camp.
