

British Air Fleet Hits Hard Blow at Nazi Cities

to the scale of the attack and very little was achieved beyond serious damage to a number of private houses.

Raids Widespread The Luftwaffe took advantage of a full moon and clear weather to range widely over England, and in addition to Liverpool, struck at London, towns in the Midlands, East Anglia and in the southwest and southeast.

The air ministry news service said night fighters were known to have downed five of the nine German bombers bagged last night and added they "probably destroyed several more."

"The deadliness of our night fighters in combat is proved by the fact that in most cases they shot the raiders down in flames with only one burst from their guns," the news service said.

LIVERPOOL AREA BADLY BLASTED, NAZIS CLAIM

BERLIN, March 13.—(AP)—Destruction "exceeding that at Coventry" was reported by German sources today to have been wrought in a vast night raid on Liverpool, in which they said several hundred planes dropped bombs for hours.

This attack was carried out as the British royal air force, also taking advantage of improving weather, made its first assaults on Berlin in 82 nights.

Sixteen persons were killed and 37 injured in Berlin, informed persons said, and other damage was inflicted at Bremen and Hamburg, two of Germany's chief ports.

The high command said the attack on the Liverpool area was carried out by several hundred planes in waves, and DNE, official news agency, said returning crewmen declared the devastation was worse than at Coventry, the Midlands industrial town which was virtually razed the night of Nov. 14.

"Hell broke loose on the Mersey," one pilot reported, describing an "ocean of flames" visible 25-minutes flight away from the scene.

Another observer declared 10,000 explosive and incendiary bombs were dropped, many ships in the harbor were damaged, and huge losses were inflicted especially among grain elevators and storehouses.

Thirteen British planes were said by the high command to have been shot down, ten of them in the attacks on Berlin, Hamburg and Bremen.

Girls At Work—Banking



Few persons do more to ease the burden of the makers of income tax reports than the Misses Lois Duncan and Patricia Aebel of the Douglas National bank. All year long they keep account of deposits and checks for thousands of persons. Their work reaches its climax of usefulness at income tax report time.

The young women pause in their daily task to smile for the News-Review photographer as he finds them at their machines. Their work covers many phases, but chief of these is the operation of the bookkeeping machines.

Their nimble fingers fly over the keyboard of 132 keys and other controls as they work batches of deposits and checks into the proper accounts. In addition to other work, the operators of the high speed machines daily work up about 1000 deposits and checks totalling about \$80,000, often more and sometimes less. Yards and yards of paper roll out of the machine on a busy day to make a control sheet of the day's work, which shows the figures in carbon copy that are posted to every account.

When the checks have been posted the young women "finish" them with a perforator that drills faster than a machine gun to punch them full of holes. There's a pattern to the punched holes that shows when a check is held to the light—a pattern smoother than the outline rifle shooting of "Buffalo Bill." The pattern gives the month, day and year in which the check was "cancelled out."

Strike in 8th Week

At Milwaukee, where a CIO called strike against the Allis Chalmers Manufacturing company was in its eighth week, John R. Steelman, chief of the U. S. conciliation service, planned separate conferences with union and company officials. The strike, which involves the question of union recognition, has held up work on \$45,000,000 in national defense orders.

Three dozen union carpenters ceased work on buildings at a \$5,000,000 army air corps base near Everett, Wash., yesterday in protest.

establish 21 more such bases in that area.

Testimony of navy officers to that effect was made public today as the annual naval appropriation bill was introduced in the house. They said bases being equipped in the thirteenth naval district were Port Angeles and Seattle, Wash.; Astoria and Coos Bay, Ore., and at Kodiak, Dutch Harbor and Sitka, Alaska.

To Cut British Loan

A high administration official disclosed today that the army and reconstruction finance corporation were negotiating to take over between \$300,000,000 and \$350,000,000 worth of British war contracts and factories in this country.

The official explained that the negotiations probably would cut British war obligations between 20 and 25 per cent, indicating that their total obligations for weapons and other war materials were about \$1,500,000,000.

The official added that since the United States, under the lease-lending bill, would provide all new weapons desired by the British, the British were expected to pay for the remaining contracts placed with American manufacturers before the bill was passed.

said British troops were continuing to mop up "in all sectors" of Italian Somaliland. In Libya, Eritrea and Ethiopia, the British said there was nothing of importance to report.

To Trap Italian Ships

The British admiralty announced today that the small strait of Bab El Mandeb at the southern end of the Red sea was "dangerous" to navigation.

Closure of the small strait leaves the British only one channel to watch to prevent any Italian ships in the Red sea from escaping into the open ocean as the land pressure in Eritrea increases, observers said.

The admiralty declined to disclose how it blocked the small channel between Perim island and the Arabian coast, but probably used mines.

Bigger Trucks Rejected

The house killed a senate bill providing for 12 ports of entry at which trucks weighing up to 68,000 pounds could come into Oregon to load and unload. Present limit on trucks is 54,000 pounds.

The senate sent three liquor bills to the governor. They would permit the liquor commission to license and regulate night clubs, permit court appeals by persons whose licenses have been revoked or suspended by the commission, and prohibit delivery by messenger from state liquor stores.

One Curry River Opened

A bill to open the Elk river in Curry county to commercial fishing in November of each year was passed last yesterday by the house, which had defeated it a few hours previously. The measure goes to the senate.

The house, however, did not reconsider the vote by which it overwhelmingly defeated a bill to open the Pistol, Winchuck and Chetco rivers, also in Curry county, during December, January and February.

The house passed and sent to the senate yesterday a bill to authorize the board of control to spend up to \$100,000 to construct national guard armories.

Salary Cut Predicted

The house killed 46 to 12 today two bills to reduce the salary of Chancellor F. M. Hunter of the state system of higher education from \$10,000 to \$7,500 a year.

The house defeated a senate-approved bill today to legalize banquets in theaters, and other trade promotion contests sponsor.

The bills, by Representatives Richard L. Neuberger and J. D. Perry, would have provided that no state official could be paid a higher salary than the \$7,500 a year paid to the governor.

Neuberger said it is unjust to pay the cost of maintaining Hunter's home, and he criticized the state for paying an annuity policy for Hunter, costing \$1,350 a year. He said Hunter actually receives \$17,000 or \$18,000 a year, asserting that if the state would buy his clothes and meals, the state then would be paying all of Hunter's living costs.

Distinction Pointed Out.

Representative A. Rennie said he feared that if Hunter's salary were reduced, the state would lose his services.

Representative James A. Roilman said that Hunter's salary is not out of line with those of other states, and he added that "the salary of the governor should not be a yardstick for other salaries, because the governor's office is an office of honor. If you want to pay less for a chancellor, you can, but you will get a man worth just what you will pay him."

In explaining his vote against the bills, Representative Warren Erwin said "this is just a feud between Dick (Neuberger) and the chancellor," but Neuberger heatedly denied this, asserting "I hardly know the chancellor at all. Mr. Erwin just doesn't know anything about this."
