Good skiing conditions at Crater lake were announced in the report received today at the local office of the U. S. forest service. Maximum temperature yesterday was 55 degrees and the minimum last night was 16 degrees, assuring a heavy snow crust. There has been no new snow for several days. Snow is now 105 inches in depth. The weather has been clear and bright and visibility is excellent. Roads are open and no chains are required.

At Diamond lake the snow depth at the resort was reported to be 18 inches with 40 inches at the summer home area. Three members of the state hatchery crew arrived on snowshoes yesterday to operate the egg taking station. The Diamond lake hatchery is the largest rainbow trout egg taking station in the world.
