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Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

A NUMBER of farmers in our part of the world are now accusing Los Angeles of stealing a portion of our weather. We are considerably short on rainfall. Our fields, woodlands and rivers need rainfall, not, of course, the quantities that have deluged the southern California Eden, but some.

The publicity enthusiasts of California have, at one time and another, swiped a number of our outstanding attractions. The favorite subject of the grab is Crater lake which has been moved to the outskirts of Los Angeles numerous times. They have hoisted Diamond lake over the line a few times and once, a few years ago, a really zealous publicist placed the Oregon caves in northern California.

They can do these things to our lakes and mountains and caves and no permanent harm is done. The movement is entirely on paper—like Italian victories thus far in the war.

But when some of our needed and rightful rainfall is taken away and dumped right on southern California—then we actually have something to kick about (and so have they).

Congratulations to the Roseburg high school basketball squad upon a most successful season.

They beat their way to the top in the southern Oregon district and that was the victory we most wanted.

You've heard, of course, about the wolf in sheep's clothing. But a Laramie, Wyo., ranch has done something more about sheep's clothing than let the wolf borrow it. To keep the wolf away from the ranch-house door, in fact, they have rigged out several hundred of the ranch's sheep in cotton clothing.

It's all part of a test being made by the department of agriculture and a cotton research laboratory. When ewes are thus clothed, the theory runs, they keep warmer, need less supplementary feed, and produce better wool.

Thus by using more cotton to produce more wool, both industries get a break, to say nothing of the sheep themselves.

Napoleon achieved quite a reputation as a wit by sagely commenting that an army travels on its stomach.

Not today. In 1941 an army travels on wheels.

Only two years ago the total number of quartermaster motor vehicles in the army was about 14,000. Today, 75,000. By the end of April 140,000. By next fall 285,000, which is the number needed for an army of 1,400,000 men.

Incidentally, in an army of that size today, nearly a third or around 400,000 men, will be either drivers or mechanics driving or servicing trucks, tanks, passenger cars, or motorcycles.

MEANWHILE, listen for a moment to our old friend "informed nazi spokesman," who says today in Berlin (with the AP correspondent reports, more solemnity than usual):

"Mr. Roosevelt is an unpredictable man. Let him send ONE CONVOY and—"

There he left the sentence hanging. Then he added: "We are determined to torpedo EVERYTHING that approaches England."

THAT is a threat. It may or may not be carried out. It is intended to bluff the United States, if possible, out of conveying merchant ships loaded with munitions to Britain.

NO rumors today (up to 11 a. m., at least) from Japan, other than that Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka, leaving for his visit with Hitler and Mussolini (and maybe Stalin), is given a great send-off by cheering crowds of Japanese.

Four Hoop Teams Reach Semi-Final At State Tourney

Salem, Seeking Third Straight Title, Plays Klamath Falls; Astoria Meets Oregon City

SALEM, March 14. (AP)—Salem high school towered larger than ever in the state high school basketball tournament today.

The field was cut to four teams yesterday and Salem was the only one of the group that won by an impressive score. Klamath Falls, Astoria and Oregon City had to struggle furiously to reach the semi-finals.

Victors in the past two years, Salem will face Klamath Falls at 7:30 tonight. This town is jammed with those who think the Vikings will win their third straight crown, but there was a solid minority who believed that Klamath Falls could defeat Salem if any team could.

The other semi-final game will pit Astoria against Oregon City at 8:30 p. m.

Salem trounced McMinnville yesterday 46-33, again paced by its fleet forwards, Dutch Simmons with 14 points and Eddie Salstrom with 11.

Marion Reginato went on an 18-point spree to enable Klamath Falls to beat out North Bend, 39 to 34, despite the efforts of the losers' Sammy Crowell. Crowell, who set a new tournament record with 31 points in his first game, tallied 15 yesterday he needs 35 more to break the four-game record of 80 points set by Leonard Gard of University high of Eugene in 1937.

All-State Roy Seeborg gave Astoria a 37-to-35 win over Eugene in a battle that saw the score tied ten times. Seeborg potted a long shot that broke a 35-33 deadlock with 11 minutes to go, and his mates stalled thereafter.

Biggest upset to date was Oregon City's 33-to-31 win over The Dalles, the pioneers trailed until the third quarter, when they struggled into a 26-to-25 lead. They moved further in front in the fourth quarter, but were almost caught by a late rally.

McMinnville and North Bend clashed at 2 p. m. and Eugene and The Dalles at 3 p. m. winners will play for fourth place.
