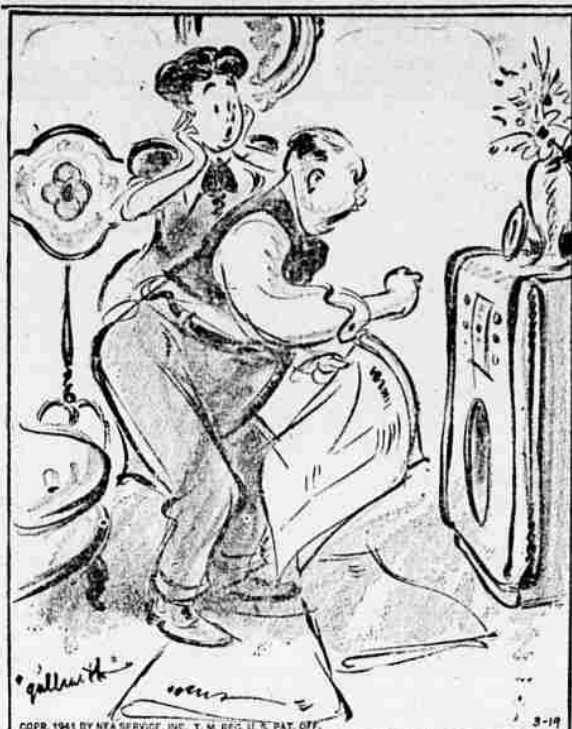

HOLLYWOOD, March 18.—(AP)—How much would you pay for a second hand hat of President Roosevelt? Edward G. Robinson, who collects paintings in private life and plays "Little Caesar" and kindred tough guys in pictures, paid \$3,200 for one last night. Then he split the bill with Actor Melvyn Douglas. How they propose to share the hat was not made clear. Hitler and his gang to cut the sea roads between Great Britain and the United States and, having divided these mighty powers, to destroy them.

REPORT "PUT-UP JOB BY WAR INCITERS" NAZIS SAY

WASHINGTON, March 18.—(AP)—Sumner Welles, acting secretary of state, said today he had been told by Viscount Halifax, the British ambassador, that the British had received reports a German submarine had been reported in the North Atlantic waters.

In Berlin, authorized sources said reports of a German long distance U-boat being en route to American waters were a "put-up job by American war inciters." They called it an attempt by the munitions industry to create war panic.

There were two possibilities seen by informed persons if the submarine report is correct.

The first was that the U-boat was being sent to the shipping lanes of the western Atlantic to prey on vessels carrying American aid to Britain, and thus make good Adolf Hitler's three-repeated promise of recent weeks that "wherever British ships cruise we shall set against them our submarines."

The second—considered more remote because of the mention of off-shore operations—was that the submarine might be a commercial vessel like the unarmed Deutschland which made two world war trips to American ports in 1916 with cargoes of dyestuffs and chemicals.

ITALIANS LOSE HEAVILY IN AFRICAN COUNTER ATTACK

CAIRO, Egypt, March 18.—(AP)—Italian counter-attacks against positions recently captured by the British in Eritrea have been repulsed with heavy fascist losses, British general headquarters declared today.

The British said the Italians left over 800 prisoners in their hands.

(This, presumably, was at Cheren, mountain stronghold bordering the British way toward Asmara, the capital of Eritrea, and Massaua, its chief port. The British command said yesterday that important heights outside Cheren had been taken.)

British planes attacked the Italian stronghold of Tripoli in western Libya, Sunday night, starting large fires on the south side of the harbor, in hangars and among military stores, the communiqué said.

a country whose defense the president had deemed vital to the defense of the United States, the right should exist to retain and use for our own immediate necessities such defense articles as the president should consider would best serve our own interests.

At the same time, the committee redrafted a section which would permit the president to transfer funds in the bill to departments which dispose of defense materials.

The committee noted that the amount carried in the bill plus authority in the basic law to dispose of a maximum of \$1,300,000,000 worth of existing materials, made the total available for British aid \$8,300,000,000.

The communiqué said all the British planes returned from their overnight raiding assignments, but the government announced that in air operations over England today two fighters, having spent their ammunition, were shot down by German planes and two German bombers were shot down into the sea.

NAVAL SWEEP FAILS TO LOCATE ITALIAN FLEET

ABOARD A CRUISER SOMEWHERE IN THE MEDITERRANEAN, March 18.—(AP)—Britain's war fleet, protecting convoys sailing into Greek ports, has swept a broad area of the Mediterranean and Aegean seas in an unsuccessful hunt for Italian warships.

British battleships, cruisers and destroyers, their guns ready for instant action, sailed leisurely through the waters of the sea Italy calls "our own."

(Allen presumably is not yet permitted to disclose that troops were aboard the convoys he watched being escorted into Greece.)

(Reports on excellent authority, however, have said that about 100,000 British soldiers—vanguard of an army of 300,000—already have been landed on the Greek mainland with full battle equipment.)

Wounded Greek soldiers, headed home through Yugoslavia in an exchange of prisoners, declared British bombings of the Albanian port of Valona had wrecked almost every building in the town and left the port in ruins.

King George of Greece, in a message to his troops, declared that "the whole civilized world follows with astonishment Greek feats of arms" and pledged that "the liberty of Greece will be defended."

This was interpreted in some quarters as renewed assurance that Greece would not submit without a struggle to the expect-

ed German invasion. Turkish newspapers still made no mention of foreign reports that British troops have already landed in Greece, but one newspaper asserted that United States aid to Britain would force Hitler to act swiftly in the Balkans.

"We must now expect Germany to play her trump card
