New Orleans Refinery Hit by \$400,000 Fire

NEW ORLEANS, March 19.—(AP)—Damage estimated by officials at more than \$400,000 was caused by an oil-fed fire which yesterday swept the \$1,000,000 plant of the Gulf Refining company and menaced huge stores of gasoline in tanks which were saved by hard efforts.

The fire was the second big blaze for the New Orleans area within a week.

Last week a fire destroyed a huge warehouse of the Bienville Corporation, Inc., just below Canal street in the French quarter with estimated damage of \$3,000,000.

The Gulf Refining company plant is just outside of the city limits. Officers expressed the belief the fire was started by sparks from a loading truck.

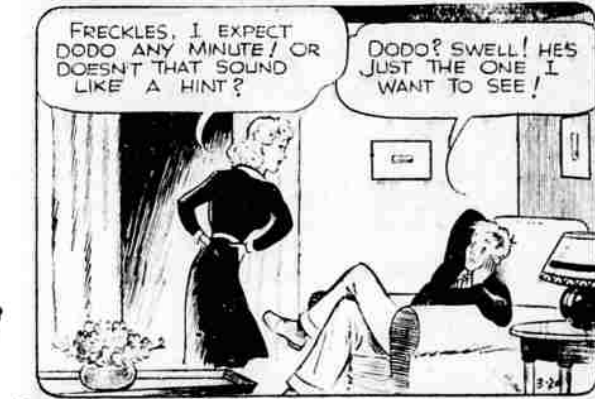
No one can read the Old Testament prophets without being impressed by the serenity with which they anticipated national dangers and calamities. The actual events which they forecast often seem melancholy enough, the word "jeremiad" had passed into our language as the symbol of pessimism, yet a close scrutiny of their messages shows that they are not more remarkable for their candor than for their courage. When they predict invasion defeat, and captivity for their nation they make no attempt to conceal the suffering which these events must bring. Usually they are able also to promise an ultimate deliverance. This quality is shown in their attitude toward misfortunes. These are used to justify instead of weakening the belief that God has His people under His special care. The seeming calamities are all parts of His schemes, the people can be sure that what they will have to suffer is a purposive discipline. Therefore they can welcome reverses as signs of God's thought and favor. Let the children of Israel be sure that whatever the strain the trials will never prove unbearable for those who have a sense of God's nearness and lean on Him for support. The Old Testament message has a new relevancy for these times. "Underneath are the everlasting arms," are words which bring courage of the best kind as with all our hopes and fears we face the future. Amen.

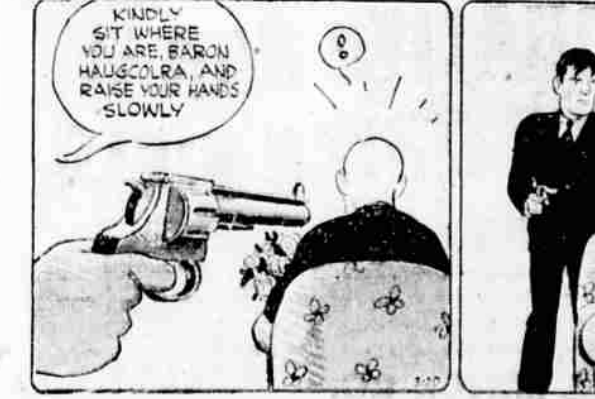

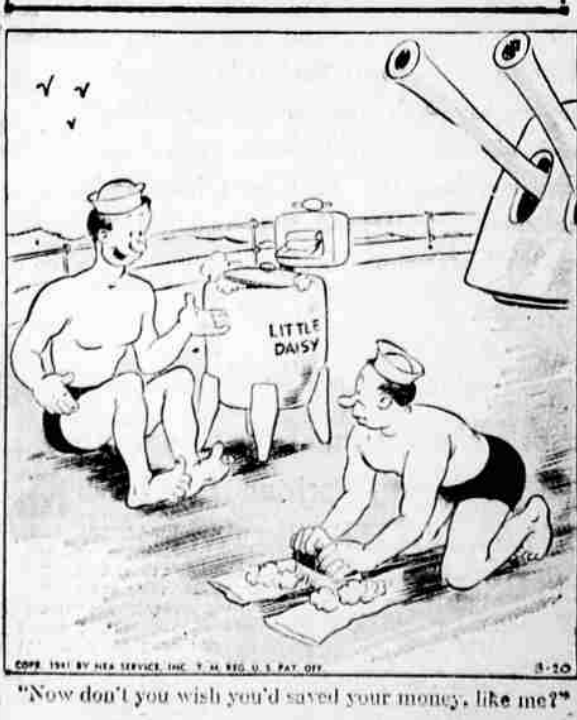
