Behemoth Simon Thinks Chances To Beat Louis Good

DETROIT, Mich., March 19.—(AP)—Ponderous Abe Simon, never known off his feet in 50 tough battles, presented a one-man ballyhoo in his own behalf today over his chances of accomplishing the seemingly impossible—defeating Joe Louis.

Simon says nobody believes him, but he is convinced, deep in his heart, that he has an excellent chance against the Brown Bomber, whom he meets in Detroit's Olympia arena Friday night in a bout scheduled for 20 rounds, or less. The New York challenger bases his conviction on the fact that he never has been hurt by a blow, that he's never been floored, and that Louis, with all his devastating power, cannot hurt him.

Simon, stretching 6 feet, 4 inches and weighing 255 pounds, has the physique to stand up under a terrific bombardment. He has powerful shoulders and arms, and a bulging chest, and not an ounce of fat on his huge frame. He has the biggest pair of hands in boxing, each measuring 14 1/2 inches.

"I realize I'm perhaps alone in my own convictions," Simon said today, "but I'm sure Louis can't hurt me. I'm getting a crack at the heavyweight championship, and I'm going to make the most of it. If Louis can't hurt me, what chance has he got to knock me out? He couldn't even knock down Tommy Farr or Arthur Gooley in their first engagements and will find me just as tough, if not tougher."

The champion plans to enter the ring for his fifteenth defense of the title scaling around 202 pounds. At that figure the world's champion will have a 53-pound weight disadvantage. But he's been up against that kind of bulk before, having flattened Primo Carnera who scaled 267 pounds.

His wife is a former resident of this county. He is one of the ablest journalists in the service of the American press. Allen would be in real danger if turned over to some of the fascist powers because of his fearless reporting. Please press the case."

RHS Basketeers Post Good Record In Season's Play

The Roseburg high school Indians already are looking to next year after completing one of the most successful basketball seasons in the history of the Roseburg school. The team, despite numerous severe setbacks, finished in the top bracket of the 16 teams competing in state tournament play, and on the season's record holds victories over the state champions and the Portland city champions.

The Indians won 18 out of 25 games for a percentage of .720. Play in the state tournament marked the end of play for Roseburg schools on the part of Jim Finlay, Royal Denton, Earl Ward, Bill Goodlow, Paul Cacy and Charles Beckley. The first four named have been playing together as a team for eight years, starting as Midgets under the direction of Dr. G. C. Finlay, and playing through junior high under Coach Hod Turner and through senior high under Jim Watts and in the last few games under the direction of Jim Davis.

Prospect Bright

All prospects point to a formidable squad for next year to take up where the tall Indians of this season left off. From this year's squad there will be big Ed Hughes, Neil Schrimpf and John Ness as a nucleus around which to start the 1941-42 squad. All three saw much action this year.

Roseburg high school this year organized a second team, known as the Roseburg Bees, and this team gained a lot of experience in play against county teams and in the Albany college invitational tournament in which they were finalists. From the ranks of the Bees will be Gerald Denny, Lee Wimberly, Melvin Baker, Harold Cacy, Lloyd Anderson, Bruce Barker and others. Tony Anderson will be eligible for only a part of the season. Graduation from junior high will make this year's Papooses available for the Indian squad next year, and George Vincent and Ward Cummings, in particular, are expected to be candidates for regular posts in the Indian ranks.

Prospects are for a tall team next year with good speed and ball handling ability, and probably with much stronger reserves than Roseburg has had for many years.

Finlay Tops Honors
This season's team ranked high in conference standings with Finlay being chosen as the most valuable player of the district and Diard and Denton being included in all-star selections. Finlay led the team scoring

for the third consecutive year by potting 67 field goals and 55 foul shots for a total of 189 points. Goodlow, Ward and Denton each converted the same number of foul shots, potting 37 apiece from the free-throw line.

Denton was the bad boy of the team with 60 personal fouls. The Indians scored a total of 770 points to 653 for their opponents, an average of 30.8 to 26.1 per game.
