Machines Protect America



OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Agricultural officials here point out that this is a machine age in farming as well as in national defense, and that farm machines like the one shown above are playing as vital a part in defense of the soil as the tire-mounted cannon below is playing in military defense. Oregon, along with the other states, is concerned with gearing agriculture to national defense needs, and has just completed a state-wide series of county conferences on this subject. The earth-moving equipment shown above has been used in building dams and reservoirs and in other conservation practices designed to protect the soil for the use of coming generations. In one year U. S. farmers have moved more than 11 million cubic yards of earth in performing such conservation practices, equivalent to the volume of material going into the huge Grand Coulee dam on the upper Columbia.

Louis Plans Quick Disposal of Simon

DETROIT, March 20.—(AP)—Joe Louis has no doubt as to the outcome of his battle with ponderous Abe Simon, set for 20 rounds or less, tomorrow night. All that is worrying the powerful negro is how long it will take to explode his 250-pound foe and whether he'll damage his hands in doing it. A damaged hand would be a serious blow to the world's heavyweight champion in his "fight-a-month" campaign. He is scheduled to box Tony Musto in St. Louis April 7 and Billy Conn in New York in June.

Louis promised today to knock out Simon with the first punch if possible. He is determined to convince hometown admirers that he's capable of finishing an opponent with a quick, spectacular knockout. In previous Detroit engagements, Nattie Brown and Patsey Perroni each stuck ten rounds with the champion, while he required eleven rounds to stop Bob Pastor after flooring him four times in the first round.
