

### Man Arrested As Church Dynamiter

LYONS, Ind., March 21.—(AP)—A Greene county farmer was held today in connection with a dynamite blast which shook the Free Methodist church here Wednesday night and injured four persons severely. Ten persons were hurt slightly and 40 others attending Lenten revival services were shaken.

Sheriff Charles Blanton and state police apprehended the man, described as a "resident of the Lyons community," several hours after the dynamite had exploded at the rear door. His name was withheld.

Prosecutor Robert L. Stevenson said the man denied any connection with the dynamiting but that evidence had been obtained on which charges might be filed later today. He said he was informed the man had had differences with his wife over her attendance at the revival services.

The sheriff said he thought the dynamite was "a personal mat-

### Yugoslavia-Nazi Pact Arouses Resentment

agreed to the government's decision.

**Nazi Troops Barred**

Belgrade sources said the alliance, which would permit German troops in Bulgaria to go to Italy's aid in Greece at once without fear of being struck in the flank exposed to the west, would enable Germany to move war supplies across Yugoslavia but not troops.

Belgrade dispatches said Yugoslavia would become the fifth nation to affiliate with the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo alliance at ceremonies next week in Berlin or Vienna.

Slavania, Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria, among Yugoslavia's neighbors in southeast Europe, previously had joined the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo axis.

The degree to which Yugoslavia's decision will facilitate German action in the Balkans, possibly against Greece to bolster the faltering Italians, was uncertain in the absence of details of the agreement that has been reached. But a responsible government leader said it would provide economic and "semi-military" aid to the reich.

The crown council approved the program last night and the cabinet later voted for it, 13 to four, after a bitter wrangle.

Pictures of President Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Churchill were displayed prominently in public places alongside portraits of national heroes in many towns, as Serb resentment apparently mounted against the government's decision.

**WRIGHT FIELD STRIKE ENDED BY AFL UNION**

DAYTON, O., March 21.—(AP)—In the avowed interests of national defense, an AFL leader today terminated a 17-day strike that had paralyzed work on an essential \$5,900,000 expansion program at Wright field, the army air corps' huge testing laboratory.

John Breidenbach, president of the Dayton central labor union (AFL), announced that 400 men who left their jobs March 4 would return to work Saturday alongside five CIO electricians employed by the Penner Construction Co.

Breidenbach's strike settlement action followed reports that the war department would take over the construction work with federal civil service laborers.

The war department pressed for prompt settlement, contending the new facilities were "needed at once by the army air corps both for the testing of engines and planes now on order and for the development of new types."

has 125,000 members, and agreed to furnish qualified painters for all defense projects even if the painters had to be brought in from another state.

**Food Dispute Easing.**

At Detroit James F. Dewey, federal labor conciliator, announced that prospects for an amicable adjustment of the dispute between the United Automobile Workers (CIO) and the Ford Motor company had been greatly improved by recent mediation conferences.

Dewey said steps taken by the company and the national labor relations board had relieved tension between the union and company since a union declaration of "intent to strike" at the Rouge and Lincoln plants, and that the company had re-employed "most" of 1,000 Rouge plant employees which the UAW-CIO contended were discharged for union activity during the past seven months.

He also said Harry H. Bennett, Ford personnel director, had agreed "to work out any problem with me that warrants my attention, such as reinstatement of men whose work has been satisfactory."

Henry Ford said, however, less than two weeks ago that he believes unions are "losing ground" and that he had no intention of recognizing them as bargaining agencies for Ford Motor company employees. He added at that time that "we do not intend to submit to any union and those who belong to one are being fooled."

### Nazi Battleships Said Near U. S. Are Identified

LONDON, March 21.—(AP)—The British Press association said today that the German warships which Prime Minister Churchill said Tuesday had "crossed to the American side of the Atlantic," were the battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau, 26,000 tons each.

The press association did not give the source of its information.

Churchill told the Pilgrims, a British-American society, that not only German "battle cruisers" but also Nazi U-boats had crossed the Atlantic and already had sunk unconvoyed British ships as far west as the 42d Meridian, which runs 1,500 miles east of New York.

### London Cop Trapped in Debris 7 1/2 Days Rescued

LONDON, March 21.—(AP)—After seven and a half days in which he lay entombed by the bomb wreckage of a tenement of a Clydeside town, Frederick Clark, 32, a policeman, was reported rescued today.

Workers were removing a woman's body when they heard his moans.

### GREECE SAID STUNNED BY YUGOSLAVIA'S ACTION

The yielding of Yugoslavia to Germany's pressure is reported today to have stunned Greek quarters who said they had been assured only a few days before that the crown council would not take any action at this time despite the insistent axis pressure.

The landing of British troops in Greece to oppose the German Balkan army based in Bulgaria, and passage of the U. S. aid-to-Britain bill also had been expected to keep Yugoslavia marking time.

In neighboring Albania, where unconfirmed border reports said fascist forces were "rapidly disintegrating," the Greeks said they had repulsed two strong tank-supported Italian attacks and had captured a cousin of Premier Mussolini, identified as Lieut.-Col. Tuveri Ciglio, commander of a battalion of blackshirts.

Reports reaching Bitolj, Yugoslavia, today said Roberto Farinacci, former secretary of the fascist party, had been killed while leading his battalion of blackshirts over the top in Albania. These reports said the extremist fascist met his death in the midst of furious hand-to-hand fighting around Tepeleni.

### Aid-To-Britain Bill Gets Subcommittee's Okay

WASHINGTON, March 21.—(AP)—A senate appropriations subcommittee approved without change today the administration's \$7,000,000,000 aid-to-Britain bill.

The bill, already passed by the house, is expected to receive prompt approval from the full senate appropriations committee. It will be taken up in the senate Monday, and some leaders forecast passage without major change by Monday night.
