

### Wheeler Says War, Peace Up to F. D. R.

WASHINGTON, March 25.—(AP)—Senator Wheeler (D., Mont.) today told reporters that final approval of the \$7,000,000,000 appropriation for the lease-lend program had given the president "everything he has asked for."

"Now," he continued, "it is entirely up to the president to determine whether this is going to be a war measure, or, as his leaders in the senate said, a peace measure."

Wheeler, who voted against the program and the appropriation, quoted Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky and Chairman George (D., Ga.) of the senate foreign relations committee as saying it was not contemplated that shipments to Britain should be conveyed by American naval vessels or that American troops should be sent abroad.

"Because of these statements," the Montanan continued, "I do not see how it would be possible for the president either to use convoys or to send men without repudiating all the promises that have been made both by himself and his leaders."

### Highway Use Denied for Moving 12-Ton Boat

PORTLAND, Ore., March 25.—(Special)—The state highway commission yesterday refused permission for C. I. Good of Eugene to move a 12-ton boat over the Stuzlaw highway, from Eugene to the Stuzlaw river at Mapleton, a distance of 67 miles.

R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, recalling that Good was allowed to move a smaller vessel once before, asserted, "he'll start building sub chasers next."

"If we set a precedent here, then he'll go into the shipbuilding business in Eugene. That's no place for shipbuilding," commented Henry F. Cabell, commission chairman, who proposed that Good "explore the possibilities" of going to the ocean via the Willamette river or using the railroad.

The full schedule for the season has not yet been completed.

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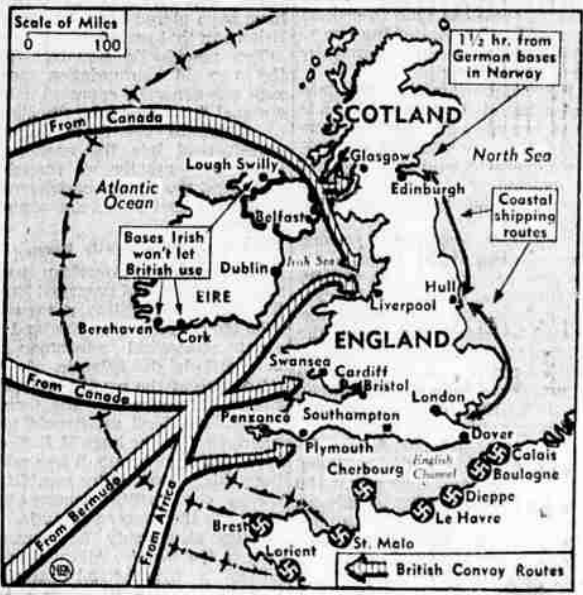
