

Steamboat CCC Will Celebrate With 'Open House'

Company 3450, CCC, Camp Steamboat F-32, will hold its celebration of the eighth anniversary of the founding of the civilian conservation corps on March 30. An "open house" is being held to give the people of Roseburg and vicinity an opportunity to visit and tour the camp and the projects being completed by the enrollees of this camp.

This is being done to help the people to understand the purpose, functions and accomplishments of the CCC.

At 10 a. m. a tour of camp will begin. Each party, upon arriving will be furnished a guide, who will explain the functions of the different departments in the camp. These tours will continue until 1 p. m. or until every visitor who so desires has been given an opportunity to see just how each department in a CCC camp functions.

At 1 p. m. luncheon will be served. The following is the menu: cranberry sauce, corn meal dressing, roast turkey, Virginia baked ham, giblet gravy, French fried potatoes, buttered asparagus tips, creamed Brussels sprouts, lettuce, tomatoes, French dressing, sweet pickles, cake, ice cream, Parker house rolls, butter, hot coffee, cream, lemonade.

After lunch the history of the company will be given by Company Commander Linus B. Martin, and T. W. Barber. Upon completion of the talk by Mr. Barber, he will introduce V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua national forest, who will give a brief history of the forest.

Upon completion of his talk, Mr. Harpham will introduce the principal speaker of the day, Dr. Charles A. Edwards.

Immediately upon completion of the after dinner speeches, a tour of the different projects will begin. This tour will be accompanied by members of the forest service staff who will give complete details of the work and how it is handled.

The roads to camp are being improved and will be in fairly good condition on this day.

A cordial invitation is extended to the people of Roseburg and all surrounding territories to attend this celebration.

Alleged Frame-Up In Murder Eyed

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, March 27 (AP)—Governor Chase A. Clark promised today an investigation "to its logical end" of an anonymous note terming former Mayor Duncan M. Johnston, twice convicted of murder, the victim of a "frame-up."

Governor Clark disclosed, following a conference with state, county and city officers, that a number of cartridges and a decomposed cartridge box had been found in the backyard at the home where Johnston formerly lived here—just where the note said they were buried.

Johnston was convicted of killing George L. Olson, Salt Lake City jewelry salesman, whose body was found in a parked automobile here in May, 1938. He once won a retrial on order of the state supreme court but a second retrial was refused. He is now awaiting action by the high court on a petition for a rehearing.

The anonymous "confession" note was mailed Governor Clark from Klamath Falls, Ore. With the discovery of the cartridges officers said the investigation now centers on learning the note writer's identity.

U. S. Must Make Up Mind On Convoys, Donovan States

WASHINGTON, March 27. (AP)—Americans, in the opinion of Col. William J. Donovan, must recognize the danger of attack from Nazi Germany, and "make up our minds what we are going to do" about delivering supplies to Great Britain.

"It is going to mean nothing in winning the war unless the goods we produce and ship reach their destination," he declared last night in a nationally broadcast address. "But due to thinness of protection, ships are sunk and goods are lost."

"Are we going to deliver the goods?" Donovan, an attorney who fought with the "fighting 69th" in the world war, returned recently from an observation tour through the European and African war zones. Although he said he had no official status, Donovan talked with President Roosevelt upon his return.

He asked his listeners if they were prepared to take the chance which would accompany delivery

of goods to Britain. "For there is a chance," he said. "There is a danger, and whatever we do we must recognize that the danger of attack exists."

The United States, he asserted,

has no choice as to whether it will be attacked. "That choice is Hitler's," he said. "Our only choice is to choose whether or not we will resist. And to choose in time; while resistance is still possible, while others are still able to stand beside us."
