THE Roseburg disposal plant and sewer system is completed-will be placed in operation soon. It is the greatest civic improvement in this city in more than a quarter of century. To them the thought of providing sewage disposal oththan using the river may present a staggering problem. All streams, beautiful wooded streams such as we have in this valley should be kept as pure as possible.
