Yugoslavia Masses Her Troops for Defense

tacked by German panzer divisions now massing along the Yugoslav-Bulgarian frontier. German anger was reflected by the Nazi radio which informed the German public of anti-Nazi demonstrations in Yugoslavia.

At the height of the upheaval, the Regent Prince Paul was arrested near the Hungarian frontier as he sought to flee the country and was brought back to Belgrade.

Later, however, he was freed. With his wife, Princess Olga of Greece, his son and two daughters, he left the Yugoslav capital shortly before midnight last night for Athens.

Germans, Italians Mauled The Yugoslav populace greeted the coup with roaring approval. Crowds roamed the streets for hours, wrecking German and Italian travel agencies, storming a theater showing German films, trampling pictures of Hitler and Mussolini, overturning and smashing German automobiles, and beating German and Italian residents. Americans and Britons were cheered.

Demonstrators dragged Swedish Minister Malm from his car and beat him severely because the minister, speaking German, was believed to be a German citizen. The 60-year-old envoy was in a serious condition.

Assistant German Air Attache Moser was attacked and seriously injured. German and Italian nationals, gaily triumphant only a few hours previously over Yugoslavia's enrollment in the totalitarian bloc, sought frantically to get out of the country.

High diplomatic sources declared Premier Simovic had advised the German minister Yugoslavia had no intention of participating in any alliance with any nation—either Germany, Britain or Greece.

Simovic was understood to have taken the position that his government would neither renounce nor ratify the treaty. There was no immediate indication what Germany might do, but even before the Yugoslav decision was reported, Nazi troops were said to be moving swiftly from the Bulgarian-Greek frontier to positions on the Yugoslav border.

British Score in Africa Developments in Yugoslavia, which held the key to the whole military situation in the Balkans, largely overshadowed new British successes in east Africa interpreted by some observers as foreshadowing a quick end of Italian resistance in that theater of war.

Finally in possession of the stronghold of Cheren, which has been blocking their drive into Eritrea since Feb. 3, British forces were reported pressing rapidly on toward the colonial capital of Asmara, 42 miles to the east.

British military circles previously had said that should they take Cheren, regarded as one of the strongest defensive positions in east Africa, conquest of the remainder of Eritrea would be a foregone conclusion.

In Ethiopia, the British were reported pressing on toward Dire Dawa and the vital Addis Ababa-Jibuti railway after capturing Harar, 35 miles to the south.

Severing of the rail line to Jibuti would cut the last link between the Ethiopian capital and the outside world—except by air—and probably result in its speedy downfall.

Rhineland Cities Bombed England herself experienced another night of freedom from German aerial attacks, but the royal air force stabbed again at industrial targets in the Ruhr and Rhineland sections of western Germany. Cologne and Dueseldorf were said by the British to have been the main objectives of their attacks.

Berlin, informed political circles intimated that Japanese Foreign Minister Matsuo, now visiting in the German capital, must make up his mind whether

Japan will enter the war against Britain actively or be left to face both her and the United States alone later.

The taking of Singapore—key British naval base in the far east—was mentioned specifically in connection with the possibility of Japanese participation in the war.

Hitch-Hike Story About Missing Student Doubted

WINNIPEG, March 28.—(AP)—Violet Ann Lindal, 19, Winnipeg honor student missing 10 days from the campus of the University of California, is not believed by her relatives here to be a hitch-hiker reported on her way to Vancouver, B. C., by F. T. Robson, Tehama county, Calif., rancher.

The girl's relatives said Violet had no grandmother at Vancouver. Robson told Berkeley, Calif., police he had given a ride to a hitch-hiker resembling the missing girl, and that she told him she was en route to Vancouver to visit her grandmother and enlist as a nurse for active service.

Road to Crater Lake Good, Free of Ice, Report

Snow depth at Crater lake was reported today to be 93 inches, with a fresh fall of wet snow about two inches in depth over the packed snow. Maximum temperature yesterday was 52 degrees. The sky was overcast and visibility was limited at 8 a. m. today, when the report was received at the local headquarters of the Umpqua national forest. Roads are reported good and free from ice. The snow level at the lodge at Diamond lake was reported to be nine inches this morning, but there was about 34 inches of snow at the south end of the lake.

RETURNING WORKERS IGNORE UNION'S THREAT

MILWAUKEE, March 28.—(AP)—The Allis-Chalmers Mfg. Co., closed by a CIO strike since Jan. 22, re-opened today in compliance with the government's demand and announced approximately one-third of the normal day shift of production men reported for work.

Striking members of the United Automobile Workers union made no effort to stop those who entered the plant. Many were jeered, however, and union cameramen photographed them.

The union reiterated its warning that those who returned before the union voted its sanction would lose their jobs when the strike ends.

Max W. Babb, company president, said the employees were being reassured that they need not worry over union threats that those who returned would lose their jobs and expressed the opinion that when the workers understood this "all but a small group" would go back to work.

The warning was voiced at a union rally near the strikebound plant by Harold Christoffel, president of local 248 of the United Automobile Workers union.

The strike arose over union demands for a union shop, wage increases and seniority adjustments.

"Scab" Brand Applies Christoffel told the union men that "from the start of the strike we have said that any man who wants to go back to work can go, but everyone who does will be a scab and we don't want them in the union."

"After we win this strike," the union head continued, "those who go in now won't be permitted to remain in the union." Christoffel urged the strikers to avoid violence, and warned the men not "to let the police provoke you."

The entire uniformed force of 41 policemen of suburban West Allis, in which the plant is located; 125 deputies from the staff of Sheriff Shinnors of Milwaukee county and a number of special deputies, including uniformed Milwaukee policemen, were on duty near the plant as the rally was held.

The company yesterday notified its 7,800 employees to return to work today.

CONGRESS CHIEFS PLAN CURB ON DEFENSE STRIKES

WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—"Big Stick" legislation, giving the government sweeping new powers to deal with defense production stoppages, was reliably reported today to be under consideration by key congressional leaders.

Responsible quarters described the projected measure as the administration's answer to criticism that it has failed to curb unnecessary defense strikes. Enactment of such a law, they added, would give President Roosevelt a "big stick" to enforce decisions which might be made by the new national defense mediation board.

The legislation under consideration, it was said, probably would authorize direct intervention in cases where manufacturers "fall"—for any reason at all—to carry out defense contracts.

It thus would broaden the existing provision of the selective service act which gives the government the right to take over plants whose owners "refuse" to cooperate in the manufacture of military equipment.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—The defense board appealed today to companies and unions involved in cases pending before it to agree at once to resume production and continue operations while negotiations proceeded.

W. H. Davis, vice-chairman of

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the board, said that hearings would be held on three of the cases tomorrow and a hearing on the International Harvester company case Monday.

Panels of three members each were assigned to handle the cases of the Vanadium corporation, the Cornell-Dubilier (condenser corporation) and the Universal-Cyclops Steel company. A five-member panel headed by Chairman C. A. Dykstra will consider the harvester case.
