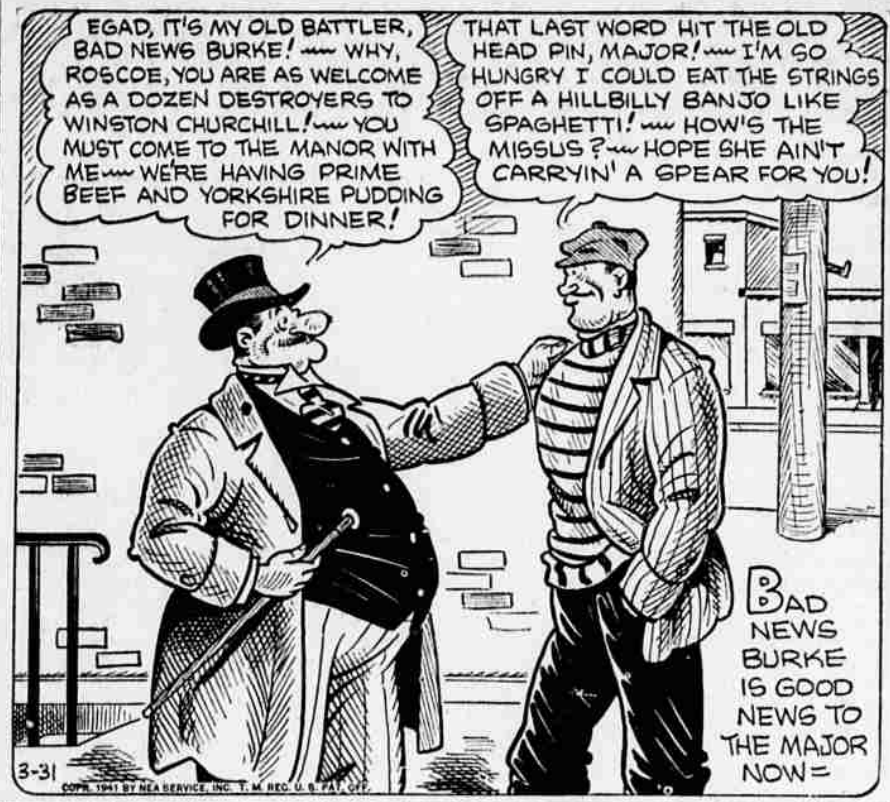

British, Greeks Smash Italian Battleships

were machine-gunned and set on fire.

One twin-engined bomber was destroyed and others were severely damaged, it was said.

Fight Still Rages

Apparently all this was one continuing action which began yesterday and still was in progress today, for the admiralty credited the RAF and the Greeks with participation in announcing that "naval operations of some importance are taking place in the eastern Mediterranean."

The British already had badly smashed one of Italy's two battleships of the Littorio class. Whether two Italian cruisers had been hit by the navy's rifles and two more by RAF bombs was not clear from the two communiques.

The admiralty promised further reports as soon as available, however.

(One ship of the 35,000-ton Littorio class was badly crippled in the British torpedo plane attack on the Italian naval base at Taranto Nov. 11, and the British have said they believed it was not yet repaired.)

(According to British sources, Italy had only two ships of the Littorio class. They are armed with nine 15-inch guns; twelve 6-inch and twelve 3.5-inch anti-aircraft guns as well as 40 anti-aircraft machine guns. They carry three airplanes.)

(On Feb. 23, however, Premier Mussolini said in a speech at Rome that two of the battleships damaged in the Taranto raid had been repaired and were virtually ready to return to service.)

Fighting in Africa

In Africa, British mechanized troops were reported in fighting contact with Italian forces retreating from Cherer to Asmara, Eritrean capital.

North of Harar, walled city of eastern Ethiopia, other British forces were said to be moving in position for an assault on Dire-dawa, whose fall would cut the Addis Ababa-Jibuti railway.

London, meanwhile, experienced its eighth consecutive raid-free night and for the fourth successive night no nocturnal raiders appeared elsewhere over Britain.

Battle In House Forecast

The farm security administration, which administers loans and grants for low income farmers, was one of the many agricultural agencies receiving increases under the big supply bill approved yesterday by the senate appropriations committee.

Russell forecast speedy senate passage Monday of the annual farm bill which carried \$450,000,000 more than voted by the house, \$445,000,000 more than President Roosevelt's budget recommendations, and \$300,000,000 more than last year's appropriation.

Although confident of senate passage, senators conceded that they faced a battle with the house over the many increases.

NAZI Bomber Attacks British Troop Ship

BERLIN, March 29.—(AP)—A long-range German bomber attacked a British troop transport in the Atlantic about 310 miles west of Cape Wrath, Scotland, and forced the soldiers to take to lifeboats, the German high command declared today.

St. Lawrence Project Is Opposed by Pacific Body

PORTLAND, Ore., March 29.—(AP)—Construction of the proposed St. Lawrence seaway was opposed in a resolution adopted yesterday by the Pacific northwest advisory board, which charged it would interfere with defense demands.

The resolution, copies of which were sent to the president and congress, asserted that the project would cost \$400,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000; that it was not properly a national defense project because construction would take five to eight years; that no extra burden should be put upon national resources in the present emergency, and that the seaway could benefit only a small proportion of the nation's people.

Finnish Vessel Victim Of Surprise Torpedoing

HELSINKI, Finland, March 29.—(AP)—The Finnish freighter Carolina Thordén, 3,645 tons, proceeding from Petsamo, in northern Finland, to New York, was torpedoed Wednesday off the Paeo islands, it was announced officially today.

The passengers and crew were reported saved.

News of the sinking created a shock in Helsinki because both belligerents in the war ostensibly had sanctioned the sea traffic to Petsamo, Finland's only outlet to the outside world.

Glenn Elliott Whiffs 15 In Win Over Linfield

CORVALLIS, March 29.—(AP)—Southpaw Glenn Elliott struck out 15 batters and allowed only three hits yesterday as Oregon State opened its baseball season with an 8-to-2 win over Linfield college.

which led to the Serb military coup.

Excuse for Invasion

Some observers suggested that Serb-Croat differences might give Germany an excuse to pounce on Yugoslavia as she pounced on Czechoslovakia.

When German troops seized Prague, Czechoslovak capital, on March 14, 1939, the move was explained in Berlin as necessary to put down riots and restore order.

A neutral diplomat arriving in Ankara, Turkey, from Bulgaria said Germany was sending an additional 200,000 troops into Bulgaria to augment a force already estimated at more than 300,000.

Axis Citizens Leaving

The German legation at Belgrade today ordered even German newspapermen to leave Yugoslavia in the apparent conviction that the new Yugoslav government will offer no acceptable compromise to axis wishes.

The British, apparently expecting that Yugoslavia may become a theater of war, ordered women and children to leave, and the Italian legation began preparing to remove all Italians from the country in event the present situation takes a "turn for the worse."

Equally as significant of the Nazi attitude on this was the order of German commercial airline, Lufthansa, canceling all flights over Yugoslav territory.

The Yugoslav government co-incidentally suspended traffic of German barges and other craft on the Danube river.

Reuters, British news agency, quoted an Istanbul dispatch to an independent French news agency today reporting that Gen. Antonescu resigned as Rumanian premier in protest against German demands.

The Associated Press had no confirmation of this report from other sources.

Japanese Foreign Minister Matsukata had a third and lengthy conversation with Foreign Minister Von Ribbentrop in Berlin today it was announced by authorized sources.

He also saw other Japanese diplomats from European capitals and had a talk with Reichsmarshal Goering.

He is preparing to depart for Rome Sunday.

22,000 Still on Strike At Six Defense Plants

The union seeks higher wages and other concessions.

Two Strikes Settled.

A strike at the Midland Steel Products company, Detroit, important to the automotive industry, was tentatively settled yesterday after 18 uncertain days. CIO union members act today on a proposal including a five-cent hourly pay rise.

CIO and management also reached an agreement affecting 1,400 workers at the plant of the Universal Cylco Steel corporation, Bridgeville, Pa. The five-weeks' strike had been turned over to the mediation board for settlement. Reopening of the plant, vital to defense, was forecast today. The agreement was said to involve a wage increase.

New Woe for Bethlehem.

Settlement of the strike at the Bethlehem Steel company's huge plant at Bethlehem, Pa., however, did not end the firm's labor difficulties.

The CIO industrial union of marine and shipyard workers authorized its leaders to call a strike of 1,500 workers in Bethlehem's Hoboken shipyards. The dispute centered on what the union called a failure to get a contract after eight weeks' negotiations.

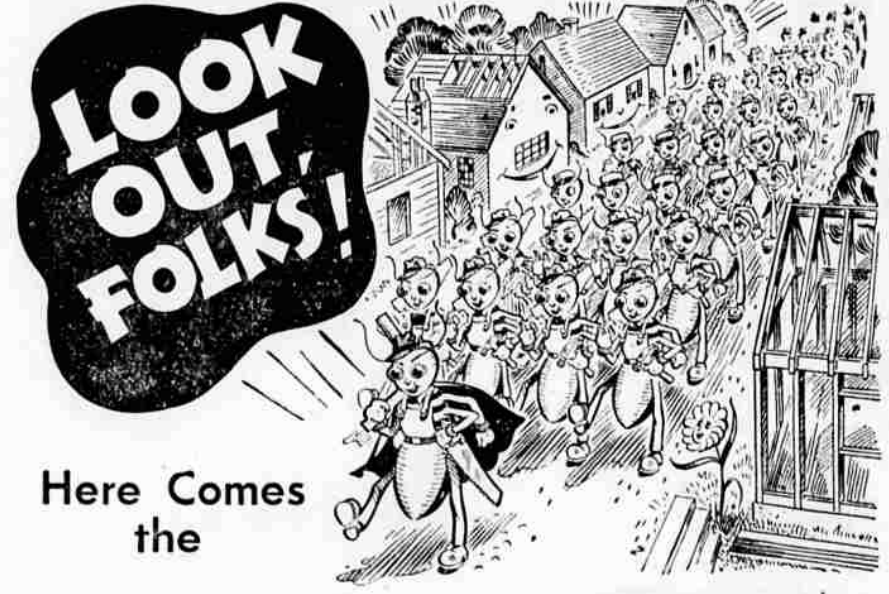
At the same time the Brooklyn, N. Y., local, claiming to represent 3,500 men in two other Bethlehem yards, appointed a committee to negotiate Monday with the firm.
