330,000 Men Halt Work in Bituminous Mines

chian agreement. President Roosevelt's intervention in the negotiations was a measure of the seriousness with which official circles regarded a coal mining stoppage. Steel mills would be affected vitally in short order. Some Washington officials estimated that bituminous consumers over the nation had an average supply to last 32 days.

Eight hundred CIO-UMW miners at Whitwell, Tenn., signed an agreement to continue working for the Tennessee Products Corp., pending settlement of the contract question. Similar agreements were signed by some miners in Kansas, Missouri, Washington, Montana and Wyoming.

Police, Pickets Battle. The coal crisis shared interest with other important labor developments. Disorder broke out again today at one of the main gates of the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing

Co., at Milwaukee as striking CIO United Automobile Workers attempted to halt a back-to-work movement. Policemen and deputy sheriffs battled a crowd which stretched for two blocks along the company's main office. One officer was smeared with yellow paint from a bottle thrown from the crowd. Apparently, no one was hurt seriously. Police discharged lussing tear gas bombs from a "mobile fortress" late yesterday into the ranks of pickets at the same plant, where CIO unionists struck 68 days ago tying up \$45,000,000 in defense contracts. The pickets had refused to move back as the police told them to do. The company reopened the plant last week at the request of high government officials, and contended that 58 per cent of its employees were back on the job. "Definitely exaggerated," said union officials to this claim. The CIO men seek wage increases, a union shop and seniority adjustments.

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bus and stage drivers who refuse to operate vehicles not serviced by the company's striking maintenance men today had the backing of the city's hundreds of street railwaymen.

At a mass meeting the street railwaymen gave "full approval and support" to the stand of the bus drivers, whose refusal to operate buses not serviced by striking mechanics has tied up five city feeder lines and stage services to rural points and Seattle.

The maintenance men went on strike Sunday for higher wages. Rural bus lines continued to operate until their gasoline tanks were dry, the drivers refusing to obtain fresh supplies from other than the company's struck garage where their vehicles have been serviced in the past.

Buses operated between Vancouver and Seattle by North Coast lines were not affected by the strike.

Woodley Stephenson Tops Bowlers in Sweepstakes

Rolling a score of 639, with handicap added, Woodley Stephenson topped 21 bowlers who participated last night in the City league singles sweepstakes. Cecil Black took second place with a score of 615. Vic Worledge was third with 599 and Ray Tannlund was fourth with 593. Games were particularly close and the results were in doubt until the last ball was rolled.

TWO MEN SHOT IN COAL FIELD OF KENTUCKY

HARLAN, Ky., April 1.—(AP) Two men were shot and wounded today as picket lines formed in the Harlan county coal fields after the United Mine Workers of America (CIO) ordered miners to quit work last midnight until a new working contract is negotiated for the Appalachian area.

Earl Jones, about 52, a mine guard, was wounded at the Mary Helen Coal corporation at Coalgood, about six miles from here. The Mary Helen is an open shop mine.

At the Harlan-Central Coal corporation at Totz, Frank Joyner, 34, identified by Capt. Green Lee of the Lynch, Ky., police department as a U. M. A. picket, was shot in the leg.

Rome Metcalf, Mary Helen mine boss, was slugged over the head and kicked as he left the entrance and five other miners were beaten.
